Article by Federal Official in Harper's Magazine Read to Show How Subtly Enemy Works in United States.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—Frederick C. Howe, the Federal Immigration Commissioner at New York, was attacked today by Senator Lodge, the Republican leader, in his speech approving President Wilson's rejection of Germany's peace feeler, as a writer of articles which the Senator characterized as pro-German orangements. of articles which the Senator characterized as pro-German propaganda. Howe's book "Why War?" and a recent article by Howe in Harper's magazine, the Republican Senator declared, were contrary to American ideals and at direct variance with the principles enunciated in President Wilson's Baltimore speech.

The book, Senator Lodge pointed out, was among those barred from soldiers' libraries by Secretary Baker's order along with others by George Sylvester Viereck, Hugo Munsterberg and Emma Goldman.

"I understand it treats the war as directed to a settlement of certain economic questions," said the Ropub-lican Senator.

Portland looms as the center of pro-duction for airplane materials in the survey of wood-working and tool-mak-ing plants in this district recently completed by the war industries board.
Under the direction of Judge C. H.
Carey, district chairman, the facilities
of each plant in the state have been
listed and accurately catalogued.

A recent inquiry from the headquarters of the western district of the Air-

ters of the western district of the Air-craft Production Board at San Fran-cisco lends color to the statement that this section in the immediate future would manufacture most of the pieces which go into the fighting planes. Use of western mills to relieve congestion in eastern centers is being con-templated, it is believed.

Oregon Has Full Capacity. Judge Carey's reply to the San Fran-cisco query, he said yesterday, was that Oregon plants had the capacity

that Oregon plants had the capacity to manufacture all the airplane material needed in the nation's war programme. The equipment is sufficient to take over the entire work, he declared the survey showed.

It is allaged that Blue left in September, 1916. On March 16, this year, Judge Kelly issued a bench warrant for Blue's arrest. His arrest took place at Ketchikan, Alaska, and he was placed under \$5000 bail, later being brought here.


