

THE DECLARANTS NOW SEEK ESCAPE

Cancellation of First Citizenship Papers Excuse From Military Service.

RUSH MADE TO SHIPYARDS

Men Deferred for Summer Alaskan Fishing After Minds on Return.

Inducted Swedes and Others Apply Diplomatic Pressure.

Cancellation of first papers by Swedish, Norwegian and Swiss declarants to obtain release from military duty goes merrily on.

Class 1 men of the same nationalities, given the special consideration of deferment last Spring for the fishing season in Alaska, are speeding into the shipyards upon their return.

Inducted men of the same three nationalities, and Russians as well, are applying diplomatic pressure in attempts to get released from the American Army.

A typical case is that of Amanda O. Olson, 27, unmarried, now giving his address as the Valley Hotel. He was placed in class 1A last March, as a declarant, having taken out his first papers March 17, 1914.

Inducted men of the same three nationalities, and Russians as well, are applying diplomatic pressure in attempts to get released from the American Army.

It is charged by draft workers that a very large proportion of declarants returned Alaska in 1918, in April both cancelling their first papers or going at once into the shipyards. In either event they will ostensibly be in position next Spring again to make the trip Northward.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—Army casualties given out for publication today total 290, divided as follows: Killed in action, 84; missing in action, 63; wounded severely, 73; died of disease, 9; died from accident and other causes, 4; died of wounds, 62; wounded slightly, 5.
