

PRESIDENT DRAWS FIRST DRAFT NAME

Executive, Blindfolded, Takes Part in Lottery Affecting 13 Million Americans.

322 INITIAL NUMBER READ

Vice-President Marshall and Sixteen Other Persons of Note Participate in Proceedings; Historic Equipment Used.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 30.—The drawing of order numbers for the 13,000,000 draft registrants enrolled September 12 was started today by President Wilson.

Blindfolded, the President groped into the great glass lottery bowl and drew out one of the 17,000 capsules. It contained a slip numbering 322, thus giving to men holding that serial number first place in their respective classes after registrants already classified under previous registrations.

The number was low enough to touch the list of every local draft board in the country except one or two of the very smallest.

Vice-President Marshall drew the second number and was followed by 16 other notables who had been invited to participate in the drawing.

Officers and enlisted men of the Army, assisted by a corps of tellers, then scouted down to the task of emptying the bowl. Two thousand numbers had been drawn and recorded before 4 o'clock, indicating that probably 36 hours would be required to complete the work.

Names to Come by Mail. Only the first 100 members were flashed to the country by telegraph. Because of the impracticability of telegraphing all of the 17,000 serial numbers, the President had asked to refrain from sending more than 100 numbers.

There was an interested crowd to witness the opening ceremony but the interest was rather in the participation than in the drawing itself.

DRAFT STATUS OF 1,000,000 MEN FIXED

Order in Call for Army Service Determined in Drawing at Washington.

ONLY FEW NUMBERS SENT

Surprising Feature Disclosed Is Preponderance of Married Men. More Than Half of Registrants Are Above 36.

The draft status of more than 1,000,000 men in Oregon was fixed yesterday by the drawing held in Washington, by tentative order numbers of only a small portion of the men were ascertained as only 100 of the master numbers were released by telegraph.

One of the surprising features disclosed here is the preponderance of married men and men above 36 years old among those heading the new lists of possible draft eligibles.

Records in Two Groups. Order numbers assigned yesterday's drawing to all men who registered September 12, or on or prior to September 21, irrespective of age. The board workers enter all registrants into two groups, consisting of those under 37 years old and those between 37 and 45, inclusive.

Nothing to Do But Wait. Registrants of 37 and above are already in a separate group with their cards segregated in the board files, and are still less concerned with order numbers.

Names in Order Drawn. In the lists appended the names are given in the order drawn, but the serial numbers are printed for the registrants, do not know what serial number has been assigned to them.
