A meeting has been called for Seattle Friday, announced President Frank Patrick, at which the directors will arrive at some understanding as to how the league will shape up. The conference means that the owners are planning to operate again this year.

Friday's session will be preliminary to the annual meeting, which will be held next month at Vancouver. Representatives of all the clubs will attend.

Several problems confront the officials. The question of players is the most serious, as many of last year's men are now in the big game.
