The Oregon hop harvest has been com-pleted and the crop is estimated at 15,000 bales. Probably an equal quantity was aban-doned on the vines. The hops that were saved were of finer quality than Oregon has preduced for several years.

of the crop harvested was sold on contract or was grown by dealers. The remaining 25 per cent is being held by the growers for speculation. Practically all the hops grown in Oregon this year will become speculative hops, savit is certain that but few of them can be used by the brewers before the breweries close down on December 1.
