These figures, a big increase over actual and suspected cases the day before, influenced the Mayor in his decision to issue the preclamation.

'While I believe that the action as requested covers very small territory in checking a communicable disease, I intend to see that it is carried out fully," he declared.

The measure is simply the result of consensus of medical opinion throughout the Nation as to the best step to take against the mysterious malady, according to Dr. Holt, who will be succeeded as State Health Officer next week by Dr. A. C. Seeley, of Roseburg. Dr. Holt is to report in the medical service at Camp Lewis October 13.

"These simply are my instructions and I believe the situation to be serious enough to warrant the step," said Dr. Holt. "We know little about it out here, so must take advice of those who have been fighting it for a month.

The 60 cases reported by various doctors are believed to be a good proportion of the total number in town. Ten cases at Benson Polytechnic School are isolated and others are being placed in quarantine as fast as possible. At least two have developed into pneumonia, it is reported. The death rate of the Spanish influenza is about 1 per cent, that of pneumonia about 9 per cent, according to health officials.

None of those at the conference would venture an opinion to the length of time which would be covered by the order, but it was said that 50 days is required to get the disease under control once it has obtained a start. Whether the malady has obtained that strong a hold on the city was a point on which officials disagreed. Two weeks may suffice to stamp out all signs of the influenza, was the most optimistic estimate obtainable.

Much difficulty in interpretation and actual carrying out of the spirit of the order is anticipated. Non-essential meetings may be carefully distinguished from those essential, it is believed. Whether the order applies to court sessions, council meetings and many other meetings bordering on conferences will be a point to be decided by city officials. Policemen and firemen will be used in keeping crowds on the move and preventing public gatherings, it is expected.
