

PROMINENT SEATTLE MEN HELD SLACKERS

Citizens Able to Invest in Bonds Hold Back.

LABOR ALSO IS CRITICISED

Failure of Workers to Respond as Expected Attributed to Delay of Macy Board Decision.

SEATTLE, Wash., Oct. 10.—(Special.)—Two prominent Seattle business men were named today as bond slackers by the executive committee of the fourth liberty loan.

At the same time the committee scored local labor for its apparent indifference to the liberty loan.

The committee reports that among those who have not subscribed is G. Poncin, rated as able to subscribe \$50,000 to \$75,000.

Further use of publicity is proposed by the loan committee unless subscriptions are forthcoming from well-known business men who are holding out.

MONACO IS FOUND GUILTY

MARIA SPINA MURDERED IN FIT OF JEALOUSY. Judge Morrow Sets Tomorrow Morning as Time for Passing Sentence on Convicted Man.

Giovanni Monaco, aged 33, was found guilty of the murder of Maria Spina early last August when a jury in Circuit Judge Morrow's Court late yesterday afternoon returned its verdict in less than half an hour from the time the case was given to it for consideration.

Monaco killed the girl in a fit of jealousy after she and her parents had denied him admittance to their home. He broke into her room during the night and killed her as she lay asleep in bed.
