To the delay of the Macy board in handing down a decision for wage adjustment in the shipyards is attributed the falling off in labor's total subscription in Seattle. -Two prominent Seattle business men

The committee reports that among those who have not subscribed is G. Foncin, rated as able to subscribe \$50,000 to \$75,000. The committee is reported to have called upon him and to ported to have called upon him and to have been kept waiting in an anteroom and to have been treated discouteously. He told the committee he would invest \$5000, and finally offered to subscribe \$15,000, it is said. Mr. Pratt, rated as able to subscribe for \$50,000 to \$75,000, purchased \$1000 worth of bonds.

Further use of publicity is proposed by the loan committee unless subscrip-tions are forthcoming from well-known business men who are holding out.
