ALL URGED TO CO-OPERATE

On Success of This Enterprise Hangs Largely Permanency of City's War Supply Contracts.

Four thousand patriotic men and women of Portland who have enlisted in the army that is to safeguard the city's war contracts by finding homes for men engaged in war industries will egin work this morning and continue until every available room, apartment and dwelling is listed. The work will e under direction of the United States housing corporation's permanent place-ment bureau, and is designed to give the Government data upon which to determine its action in the placing of

future war contracts.

Residents of Portland are asked by Residents of Fortland are asked by the Administration to co-operate in every way possible to make the survey a success. With the survey completed it is expected that every room that might house a war worker will be listed at headquarters. Persons having large dwellings with unoccupied rooms are urged to throw their places open for women or men roomers during the for women or men roomers during the war emergency now confronting the city. Families with growing children, while not advised to accept roomers, are asked to list their rooms for information of the bureau. Workers will not be assigned to such homes unless it is urgently necessary.

Full Co-operation Urged. "Rent a room for a worker" is the elogan adopted for the two days' canslogan adopted for the two days' can-wass. The publicity campaign, while hampered to some extent by the influ-enza quarantine, has been carried on through the medium of streetcars, mercantime establishments and the press, and householders have been shown the necessity of whole-hearted co-operation.

Progress of the War.

THE German battle line in France L continues to bend under the attacks of the entente allies, but nowhere has it been broken.

The enemy almost everywhere is re treating toward new positions. But his retreat is orderly and the British, French and Americans are being compelled to fight their way forward slow ly in the face of enemy machine gun detachments acting as rear guards. Highly important strategic positions have been captured by the British and French, while the Americans have further advanced their line on both sides of the Meuse, obtaining their objective.

The British advance has brought them to the gates of Doual, which long has prevented them from closing in upon the great bend in the line which has Lille as its center and which has been considered by the military ex-perts as the keystone to the German defense system through Northern Bel-

To the south the French have blotted out both La Fere and Laon and the greater portion of the St. Gobain massif standing in the elbow where massif standing in the elbow where the line runs eastward toward the Swiss frontier. Here also the Germans for weeks had stood fighting desper-ately, realising that a successful ad-vance by their foes would shatter-sail their military plans in the south and probably compel a swifter retirement than now is being carried out and pos-sibly made untenable the entire Meuse line.

By the successes of the British and the French, the German line from Rheims to the Belgian frontier is made decidedly more unstable, and with the new advances of the French and the Americans in Champagne and along both sides of the Meuse northward, seemingly the enemy, for few days at least, will have to hasten his steps eastward and northward to prevent the great converging maneuver from cap-turing large numbers of prisoners, especially in the pocket from the re-gion northwest of Rheims to La Fere.

Along the Aisne in Champagee the French have crossed the river at various places and are almost upon the important railway town of Rethel. North of Vousieres they are advancing toward Sedan. In the bend of the Aisne more than 35 localities have been the graph and saveral Aisne more than as localities have been liberated by the French and several thousand civilians freed from bondage. Since the offensive began 71,567 Germans have been made prisoners and 600 of their guns captured.

Operations in Serbia and Albania like-

wise are being carried forward suc-cessfully. Nish, the capital of the lit-tic kingdom, after the invasion by the Austro-Hungarians, has been recap-tured and the enemy driven to the hills north of it. The Austro-Hungarians are slowly but surely being driven northward in Albania and now are being engaged in the region of Ipek, 30 miles southwest of Novipazar.
