Reports of New Cases in Port- Four Physicians III; Several Deaths land Grow Fewer.

DEATH TOTAL IS NOW 41

Four Big Wards Are in Operation in Auditorium and Stage May Be Fitted With Beds.

Although the number of new cases of Spanish influenza continues on the wane, deaths attributed to the epidemic are responsible for breaking all death records at the City Health Bureau. Yesterday 41 deaths were reported, of which is were due to influenza. This

brings the total known deaths from the malady to 41 in Portland. New cases for the past 48 hours were given as 154, bringing the total to 1:61 for the past three weeks. The average of deaths from all causes in Portland is about nine daily.

encouraging feature yesterday was that several cases were discharged from the city's emergency hospital as cured. The hospital has been open only five days. Four deaths have occurred there. W. H. Shields, 28, of 413 Stark street, died there early yesterday. Four Wards Now in Use.

Four big wards are now going full blast at the Auditorium. At first it was believed that the two upper wings might accommodate the emergency cases, but it was found necessary to use the north and south wings of the

main floor. About 135 cases were quartered there last night. The stage will be the next to be fitted up as a hospital ward. One hundred additional beds have been sured, which makes a total of 200 beds now ready for occupancy. A general improvement in most of

the cases under surveillance is another encouraging point in the epidemic. With the number of new cases under he high marks set the middle of last week, health officials believe the out-break well under control. Further and stricter observance of the closing rules with avoidance of crowds is recom-mended by Dr. Parrish as a means of bringing the epidemic to an early end.

SIX STATES GET RELIEF

INFLUENZA SITUATION BETTER IN SOME REGIONS.

Decrease of Cases in ArmyReported. Public Use of Gauze Masks at San Francisco Urged.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—Improve-ment in the influenza situation in six states was shown by reports to the public health service, but 27 other states reported the disease still spread-ing with many additional cities and rural districts affected. Conditions were apparently worse in Pennsylvania, where, it was estimated, there have been 250,000 cases, with probably 150,-000 in Philadelphia. For the first 18 days of October 14,805 deaths were re-ported in the state. In Army camps a slight increase in

both influenza and pneumonia cases was reported Sunday, but a decrease was shown today with 2007 influenza cases and 768 pneumonia cases, the lowest figures reported since the epi-demic became general in the camps. For the 48 hours ending today at noon new influenza cases totalled 6665; pneumonia 2079 and deaths 319. These figures brought the total of

influenza cases since September 13 to 290,447; pneumonik cases to 45,055 and deaths from all causes to 15,072. States reporting improved conditions today were Delaware, Georgia, Maine, Massachusetts, South Carolina and In California 25,000 cases had been reported to October 19.
