WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 .- Despite peace talk and influenza, american citizens have responded for a fourth time to the Government's appeal for war loans

with more than was asked.

Total subscriptions of \$6,866.416,206 from more than 21,000,000 individuals is the record of the fourth liberty loan as announced today by the Treasury, based on careful estimates by the 12 Pederal reserve banks. The entire \$866.416,000 oversubscription will be accepted and applied to reducing the size of the fifth loan, to be offered in

the Spring. Final figures may send the fourth loan total even higher. Owing to long delay by banks in tabulating their pledges, reserve banks were instructed by the Treasury to report conservative estimates of their sales are subscrib-ers, making these too low rather than too high.
