ATTORNEY-GENERAL IS ASKED FOR LEGAL OPINION.

Suspension of Salaries During Influenza Epidemie Causes Educators to Seck Counsel.

SALEM. Or., Nov. 1.—(Special.)—District Attorney Evans, of Mulinomah County, will ask Attorney-General Brown for an opinion as to the authority by which Portland schools are closed, it is understood from word received here. The inquiry is said to have been inspired by the fact that the School Board for the Portland district has refused to pay teachers salaries for the duration of the Spanish influenza epidemic until the legality of the situation is determined.

It is understood there is much dissatinfaction among the school teachers in Portland over the fact that they are unable to secure their salaries.
