

EX-GOVERNOR WEST RECALLED TO STAND

Fourteen Persons Testify for Dr. Marie Equi.

COOK VOLUNTEER WITNESS

Prosecution Hopes for Conviction on Reports of Intelligence Department of U. S. Government.

In her own defense, Dr. Marie Equi will take the witness stand today in the Federal Court, where she is on trial charged with violation of the espionage act, by referring in disparaging remarks to the flag and the soldiers.

Fourteen witnesses for the defense were called yesterday. These were either character witnesses, who never heard Dr. Equi's loyalty discussed and considered her reputation for loyalty good, or else they were members of the I. W. W., with some exceptions, who heard her talks and testified that they did not hear her speak disrespectfully of the flag, Army or Navy.

Former Governor Oswald West was recalled to the stand yesterday morning and said that he had never heard her loyalty discussed. Others who testified in a similar strain were Dr. Katharine C. Manion, a college-mate of the defendant; Dr. Viola May Coe, Frank N. Curtis, member of the Central Labor Council; E. J. Stack, secretary of the State Federation of Labor; and Circuit Judge W. N. Gatens. John Hays, a stockman of Central Oregon, said he had never heard the woman's loyalty questioned except once, up in the bunchgrass country, where someone did not think she was loyal, because of stories in the newspapers. Dr. Equi recently attended the wedding of Mr. Hays, the young woman dying of influenza a few days ago.

Cook Volunteer Witness.

Several witnesses were present at the I. W. W. hall, where Dr. Equi is said to have made the disrespectful remarks. One of these was Edwin Mellins, who has been cooking for the soldiers in the spruce division at Miami, in Tillamook County. Mellins, who is a veteran of the Boer War, said he had dropped into the I. W. W. hall on the night in question to rest and read. He considered all of Dr. Equi's remarks uninteresting until she referred to the frustrated rebellion in Ireland. This was the only point in her talk which attracted his attention, he said, but he gave her half an ear while he was reading. He heard no reference to the flag or the Army and came as a volunteer witness when he read in the press that the doctor was on trial. He said a spirit of justice prompted him to volunteer his testimony, for had he

heard her or anyone else speak disrespectfully of the flag or the Army he would have fought her on the spot.

The most remarkable thing about Mellins' testimony was his ability to recall what he was doing at any hour on any date mentioned by United States Attorney Haney. Deputy United States Marshal Frank Berry was called by the defense. Berry said he was at a meeting where Dr. Equi spoke, but heard nothing out of the way. Mr. Curtis had heard nothing unpatriotic in a plaza talk of the doctor.

Blanket Day Recalled.

A typical soapbox I. W. W. speech was delivered from the stand by Dave Morris, an I. W. W. and former organizer. He made a talk about "Blanket Day," when, on May 1 last, all lumberjacks were urged to burn their blankets—but there wasn't much of a burning. Morris testified that he never saw an American flag in an I. W. W. hall, as "they don't use it there." He asserted that no references were made to the flag or Army by Dr. Equi on the night she is supposed to have made the utterances of the doctor.

Frank H. Nash, born in Hartford, Conn., 18 years ago, and an I. W. W. for the past two years, said he was present at the Equi lecture and that her talk dealt with industrial conditions; that she read from a Masonic book to show that originally Masonry was as radical as the I. W. W., but when the Masons got into money they lost their high ideals. Nash, who served four years in the Navy, says the doctor did not speak disparagingly of the flag or the service.

Federal Record Introduced.

Erskine Wood, son of C. E. S. Wood, testified that he witnessed part of the rumpus in the Preparedness-day parade, when Dr. Equi is said to have flung an American flag to the street. Wood did not see that part of the affair.

At the conclusion of the testimony, George Vanderveer, attorney for the defense, read long and copious extracts from the report of the National Industrial Commission. The report is in 12 volumes, but Vanderveer quoted from a booklet hitting the high spots. The argument of the defense will be that it was from this booklet that Dr. Equi spoke in the I. W. W. hall, and that when a person reads from official Government documents the reading cannot be considered disloyal.

The evidence of the Government against Dr. Equi depends principally on the reports of operatives of the military intelligence department, who attended the meeting, and the testimony of two men who claim that she made slurring remarks when a military funeral passed the Plaza where she was speaking.

ESCAPED CAPTAIN RETURNS
