

MOSEY SAYS VINTON HAS CLEAR SAILING

Sixteen Votes Declared Ready to Support Senator.

SPEAKER RACE IN BALANCE

Interest in Contests Center in Portland as Time Draws Near for State Legislature.

Senator W. T. Vinton has enough votes pledged to elect him President of the State Senate at the coming Legislative session, according to Senator Gus C. Moser, who has been managing the Vinton campaign. "Senator Vinton" announces Senator Moser, "has 16 Republican votes and two Democratic votes pledged. Sixteen votes are enough to elect. The list of supporters will not be announced for a few days, as an opportunity will be given two or three others to sign up."

The last two Republicans were secured within the past 48 hours, and when this was accomplished Vinton went home. While Vinton had 18, including the Democrats, he wanted to have enough Republican votes to put him over, but this does not mean that party lines are drawn, for they will not be.

If the Presidency contest is settled, as Senator Moser states, the speaker ship is as far from solution as ever, apparently. All the candidates for Speaker are still in Portland and none appears anxious to overlook any bids.

Speaker Contest in Doubt.
Representative W. Fuller, who was in Portland a couple of days, was pulled toward the Herbert Gordon camp, but had a talk with Seymour Jones, and says "the best thing I've heard is that I'm for Burdick." Fuller has also been considered in the Kubli column.

Mr. Jones is believed to have the following as his support: Dedman, Cross, Schuebel, Brand, Thomas, Elmore, Looney, Weeks, Hughes, Martin and Thrift, and counting himself, 13 votes.

Mr. Gordon is believed to have Gore, Bean, Griggs, Letgren and three others, not including himself. Mr. Burdick is said to have at least nine of the 11 Eastern Oregon delegates and in addition Ballagh, Lewis, Coffey and McFarland. Mr. Kubli is believed to have Richardson, Hestford, Fuller and votes scattered in the Willamette Valley and along the Coast.

Mr. Sheldon's positive strength is not known, nor have any names been mentioned. He says he has some votes in Eastern Oregon and some in Multnomah.

Feelers Are Sent Out.
The foregoing list of names is founded on "information and belief," and is given as an indication of the way rumors run. In no sense is it authentic, but it is approximately correct.

Interest is centering in the Multnomah delegation. There are 13, including Lofgren, for the Representative of the 12, two are candidates. The way the shop talk runs, this is the way they are leaning:
Lofgren is for Gordon. Coffey, Ideman, Lewis, McFarland are supposed to be Burdick supporters; Joseph Richardson is for Kubli and so is Hestford. Richardson will go to Gordon when the latter shows six Multnomah votes for Gordon. Moore, Horne and Smith are unplaced, but Jones' friends are trying to bring them into the camp of the Marion County candidate, and feelers are sent out by other candidates.
Speaking of feelers, Gordon telegraphed to an Eastern Oregon Representative stating that he contemplated a tour in that section in behalf of his candidacy. He received an answer that the trip would be a waste of time.

PRAYER AND SONG HEARD

Never before, in the long succession of happy holidays, has Thanksgiving come to Portland at a more significant season. Victory and peace are sauces that will lend zest to the humblest dinner, and prosperity has decreed that although conserving food that may be exported to feed the hungry millions of Europe.

So Thanksgiving comes this morning to Oregon and Portland, with the certainty that whosoever it may knock there will find faces of gratitude. It is true that here and elsewhere the holiday guest will deary some window with a gold star on the service flag. At the White Temple will be union services. Rev. Joshua Stansfield will deliver the sermon.

America's Part in War is Topic.
