

SCHOOL BOARD TODAY TO PASS ON BUDGET

Adoption of Estimates for the Coming Year Expected.

SOME CHANGES SUGGESTED

Lift in Salary of Superintendent Is Among Features Recently Recommended to Board.

The Portland public school budget, it is expected, will be brought to the School Board at a special meeting scheduled for 10 o'clock in the Court house.

Several changes, among them a provision to increase the superintendent's salary from \$5000 a year, with a schedule for the next three years paying \$7500, \$8500 and \$9000, respectively, were proposed by the School Board when it first considered the 1919 budget submitted several weeks ago by School Clerk Thomas.

New Superintendent Likely. If the new salary schedule goes through tomorrow a new superintendent undoubtedly will be brought to Portland, as Acting Superintendent Grout, it is said, will not be a candidate, and L. R. Alderman, ex-superintendent of schools, and now superintendent of war activities, has declared he would not push his candidacy.

Other Business Promised. It is rumored that a number of residents in the Hawthorne School district may ask an appropriation for a new grade school building.

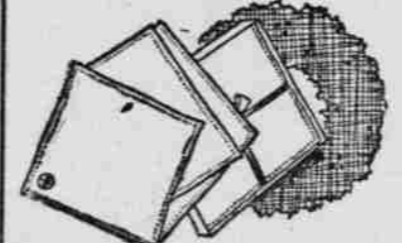
