OPTIMISTIC REPORT MADE—The December bulletin of the Federal reserve bank for the 11th district, expresses the belief that the change from war activities to peace conditions will cause less disturbance here than in any other district. Products of the district are such that an uninterrupted demand for them will continue. Bank clearings for 18 principal cities for the month of October were 24.7 per cent greater than for the corresponding month of 1917, and 22 per cent greater than for September.

SLUMP NOT FEARED IN WOOL TRADE—E. L. Thompson, manager of the Portland Woolen Mills, who has returned from a conference of wool manufacturers held in San Francisco, does not think there is any prospect of a slump in wool prices due to Australian stocks being dumped on the market. The Australian supply is controlled by the British government. There is no restriction on American mills manufacturing goods for civilian use now, but the trade is slow about placing orders, evidently anticipating a decrease in prices. Manufacturers, in order to keep their plants operating are offering to accept orders, the price to be fixed when the goods are delivered, so that if costs decline the dealers will get the benefit.

MEDICAL SOCIETY TO MEET—The Portland City and County Medical Society will meet at 8 o'clock tonight in the Portland Hotel. Dr. George F. Koshler will speak on cases in practice, with X-ray slide demonstrations. Another paper will be read by Dr. Ernest F. Tucker. New stars have been added to the service flag to represent the names of Dr. Harry Blackford and Dr. C. G. Rattner, of Portland, and J. P. Ditto, of Rainier, Wash. The annual meeting of the society will be held December 15, 1918.

MOORE LODGE TO HOLD INITIATION—Portland Lodge, No. 291, Loyal Order of Moose, will hold its regular monthly initiation this evening and in addition to the usual routine will listen to Fred Lockley who has lately returned from the battle front in Europe. Several prominent Portlanders are to be initiated and an interesting evening is looked forward to. Wednesday evening, December 11, an entertainment and dance will be given jointly by the Junior Order of Moose and Portland lodge.

WILLARD ELLIOT ARRIVES IN FRANCE—Mrs. Willard A. Elliot has received word that her husband, a former Portland restaurant proprietor, who left for overseas as a Y. M. C. A. secretary, has arrived in France. Mr. Elliot sailed from New York on November 12.

WAR EMERGENCY FINES HEAVY—Thirty thousand and sixty-eight dollars and fifty cents is the total amount of fines collected by the city for the past ten months from February 1 to November 30, from convictions secured by officers of the war emergency squad, according to the monthly report submitted December 1 by Lieutenant Thatcher to Chief Johnson, of the Police Department. A total of 10,875 days were spent in jail by offenders and 2321 arrests were made by the officers. Twenty-five cases are still pending.

SUM OF \$100,000 PAID FOR LOT.—Announcement of the Northern Pacific Company, that the 50-by-100-foot lot at 82-81 Fourth street from the heirs of Rosetta Sherlock was made yesterday by the Title & Trust Company. The purchase price was approximately \$100,000. The lot was leased by the company and improved with the eight-story Title & Trust building five years ago. An option on the lot was obtained at that time, but the purchase was not consummated until this week.

MEAT CUTTERS GET NINE-HOUR DAY.—The Retail Meat Merchants' Association, of Portland, in order to improve working conditions of their employees, announce the adoption of a nine-hour day for meat cutters. Beginning Monday, December 9, Portland retail markets will open at 8 A. M. and close at 5 P. M., including Saturdays. This grants local meat cutters shorter hours with better pay than prevail in any other city on the Coast, the association says.

MAN ARRESTED; WHISKEY FOUND.—Charles Carlson, 37, an employee of the Northern Pacific Terminal Company, was arrested by Patrolman Cameron yesterday and charged with violating the prohibition law. Police say he had ten pint bottles of whiskey in his pockets when arrested. Forty-three pints were found in his room in the Rainier Hotel. Police claim he has been buying the liquor from negro porters for \$4.50 a quart and retailing it at from \$5 to \$10 a quart.

MILEAGE WARRANTS AWAIT CLAIMANTS.—Warrants in payment of mileage for bringing ballot boxes into the City Auditor's office are awaiting claimants at the City Hall. Few of the election officials or others who gathered in the boxes have called for their pay, according to Deputy Auditor James. Amounts to be paid vary from 20 cents to \$1.50.

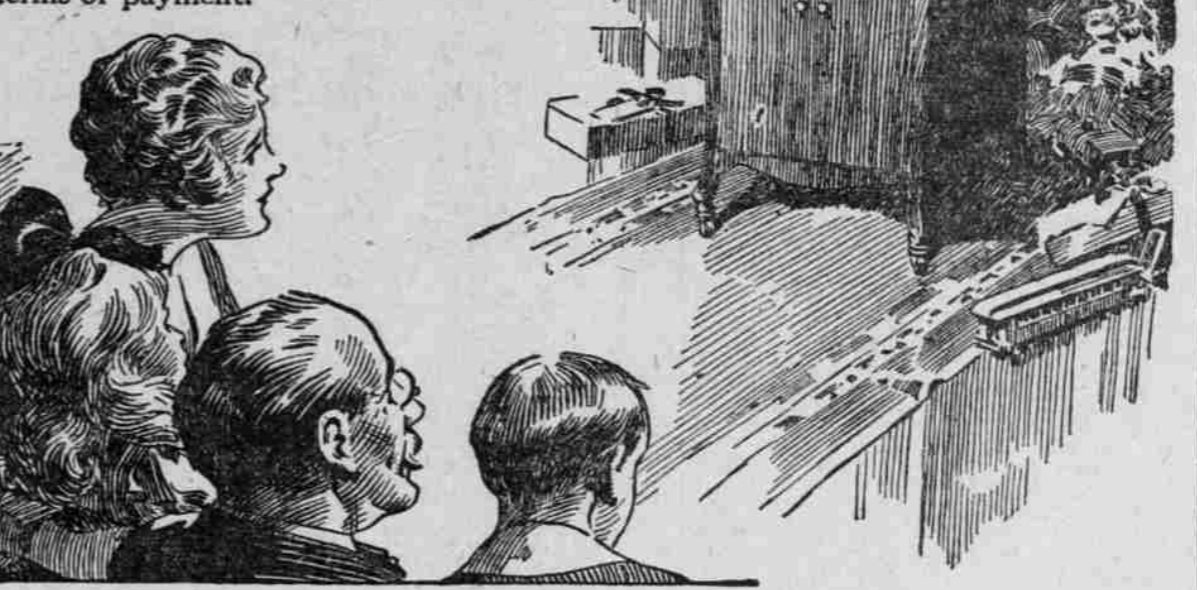
