Seat Sale for Thursday's Smoker Opens Today.

DEMAND SHOWS INTEREST

Frank Farmer Training Faithfully for Coming Clash With Jimmy Darcy at Heilig.

Seats for next Thursday night's boxing smoker at the Heilig Theater will be placed on sale today at two of Portland's leading smoke shops...

At a meeting of the Boxing Commission held Monday night it was decided to increase the price of general admission to the coming bouts from 50 to 75 cents.

Tommy Tracey received a letter yesterday from Frank Farmer, Jimmy Darcy in the main event. Farmer is training faithfully and in his message he is confident of his ability to topple Darcy off the boards via the knock-out route.

"All I ask of Darcy is to stand up and fight," writes Farmer. "If he will do that much I'll guarantee Portland fight fans that I'll send him home a badly beaten boxer. I expect to knock him out this time and he was never in better shape to pull the trick. Roumanians in Portland and any other of Darcy's followers who think Jimmy can beat me will be accommodated with wagers if they care to back up their opinion."

That Farmer is confident he can beat Darcy goes without saying. The big fellow who has beaten most of all the light-heavy and heavy-weight boxers on the Pacific Coast, with one or two exceptions, says he could beat Darcy. He will have a chance to prove it next Thursday night.

James W. Coffroth, greatest promoter of world's championship ring battles, is of the opinion that California boxing enthusiasts overlooked a golden opportunity to put across an amendment to the laws of the Bear State permitting of 10-round boxing bouts at the recent November election.

Coffroth claims that such a measure being placed on the ballot it would have carried without much trouble and passed by a 2 to 1 vote. He claims the people of the state are in a very receptive mood regarding the legalizing of boxing, as they have become educated to it as they never were before.

A few of the biggest arguments in California for the legalizing of boxing bouts of 10 rounds' duration is the present cleanliness of the sport, harmony among promoters, and the biggest point is the thousands of dollars raised from boxing smokers and turned over to various charities.

The allied promoters of San Francisco have arranged a smoker for tonight. Clair Bromo, of Portland, is one of the promoters who has agreed to meet Eddie Mahoney, Bromo was originally scheduled to fight Young Azevedo, but "Azy" has the "flu" hence Mahoney will take on Clair.

LINCOLN WINS FROM WASHINGTON, 26 TO 0

Dewey's Squad Takes Step Toward Championship.

LOSERS FIGHT TO LAST

Absence of Haak, Washington's Best Ground Gainer, Is Shown in Score.

Captain "Ad" Dewey's Lincoln High School eleven advanced one more notch toward the championship of League B yesterday afternoon on Multnomah Field, when it trimmed Washington, 26 to 0, before a crowd of nearly 2000 fans. Almost two full quarters of the contest were played in the twilight and the lights that surround the historic gridiron had to be used as the fourth quarter could be played out.

Lincoln scored two touchdowns in the first period, one in the second period and one in the fourth. Jake Enkels, Lincoln left guard, kicked goal on the first and third score and missed on the other two, giving Lincoln a total of 26 points.

The first touchdown was registered by Left Half Irvy Cole, who smashed his way around the Washington defense for about ten yards and score. Washington staged a miniature comeback in the last few minutes of play with a series of attempted passes, but could not place the Lincoln defense.
