Francis Leo Dolan, Portland boy, ormer telegrapher for the Southern Pacific Company and previously office boy of The Oregonian, helped to trans-mit the peace news from London to the United States. Rated as first-class to France and then to London, where he has been stationed at the United States headquarters. He has also worked directly under Admiral Sims and in the office of the American Am

bassador in London. His last letter to his mother, Mrs. Sophia Dolan, 1011 East Thirteenth street North, was under the date of November 12, the day after the armistice was signed. Mr. Dolan writes: "I must tell you how London acted

"I must tell you how London acted on Peace day. Every one is crazy—all singing and dancing. No one went to bed at all last night. I was working and could see them crowding the streets. Tonight they are at it again. "The streets are lighted now and it seems strange too. We have been seems strange, too. We have been going around in absolute darkness until last night. I am tickled to death and anxious to get home again. Have been working steadily and have had the honor of handling the peace mes-sage going to the States. Suppose the eace terms will mean more telegraphy and I may have to return to France.
"The 'flu' epidemic seems to have left with the coming of peace. I am counting on being home for Christmas."
