STORY OF ATTACK LEADS TO SHOOTING

Mrs. Nels Carlson Tells Husband of Affair.

SLAYER MAKES CONFESSION

Police Secure Information Showing Motive for Murder of Gus Johnson.

Nels Carlson, 265 Going street, shot and killed Gus Johnson, 927 Williams avenue, at 10:15 A. M., yesterday in a garage adjoining the Carlson residence

immediately after Mrs. Carison residence, immediately after Mrs. Carison had told her husband that Johnson had attacked her, according to Carlson's story to the police after he was arrested. Carlson was arrested by Patrolman Schad and Inspectors Coleman and Ackerman, and charged with second-degree murder. Mrs. Carlson made a statement of the circumstances leading up to the shooting, and Deputy District Attorney Hammersley ordered her release.

Her story of Johnson's attack on her was that he came into the basement of was that he came into the basehen to her home while she was working there last Friday, threatened her with a revolver, and then struck her with his first. She says she lost consciousness, and when she recovered she attempted to conceal the affair from her husband. She says she did this because Johnson and threatened to kill hold of them if and threatened to kill both of them if she exposed him.

Mr. Carlson says that after hearing

his wite's confession he ran to the garage and found Johnson under an automobile working on the engine.

"Come out here; I want to talk to you," he says he ordered.

Forehead Powder-Burned. According to the slayer's statement

Johnson arose and walked toward him. Carlson opened fire at short range. Johnson fell. Then he walked up to the body and fired the last shot into the head. Johnson's forehead was burned badly with powder.

on three months ago, when her husson three months ago, when her hus-band rented him a garage on the Carl-son premises. The woman described Johnson's attack naively, giving the impression that he wood in strictly cave-man style.

Mrs. Carlson said her husband had herrowed the revolver a 25 caliber

Mrs. Carison said her husband had borrowed the revolver, a 28-callber six-shooter, from Edward H. Tennant, 980 Vancouver avenue. Mr. Tennant, identified the weapon as his property, and said Mr. Carlson got it Tuesday night. Mr. Tennant said Mr. Carlson was nervous because he had heard a burglar in his house the night before. The supposed burgiar, according to Mrs. Carlson, was Johnson, who had entered the house and concealed himself in a closet. The woman said she opened the closet to get her nightgown and bathrobe, and that Johnson threatened her with his revolver again.

Burglar Not Recognized.

Mrs. Carlson said she woke her hus-band when she heard Johnson leaving, and that Mr. Carlson pursued him with an empty shotgun. Johnson got away apparently without being recognized

Despite Mr. Carlson's statement that Johnson stood up before the shooting, police are inclined to believe, from the position of the body and the direction of the shots, that the victim was lying on his back under his automobile when he was killed. Police also are investi-gating the reason why Mr. Carlson was so jealous of Johnson.

Captain of Inspectors Circle attempted to turn the quizzing of Mr. and Mrs. Carlson into a star-chamber session, but Deputy District Attorney Hamobjected and insisted that or reporters be present, Johnson was 33 years old. He leaves a brother, Alfred Johnson, who lives at 227 Williams avenue. He was a shipworker and was employed in the Foundation Company's shipyards until recently, when he was laid off, and went to the Standifer Construction Cor-poration's yard. Four of the shots took effect in his body, He had lived in Port-

and 15 years.

Mr. Carlson has three children. He also is a shipyard employe. He formerly was City Marshal at Rainier, Or.
Inspectors Coleman and Moraksearched Johnson's room last night
without finding the revolver of which
