SOCIALISTS GIVE NO TO GOVERNMENT

Editor of Paper Makes Admission During Trial.

BERGER'S ARTICLES READ

J. Louis Engdahl Is Cross-Examined Regarding Contents of Publication.

CHICAGO, Dec. 22.—Under cross-ex-amination today, J. Louis Engdahl, editor of the American Socialist, who with four others, is on trial before Judge Landis charged with violating the es-pionage law, admitted that he had never printed a line in the paper which might have aided the Government's successful prosecution of the war. He did not deny having printed pages of editorials, statements, speches and interviews against the war and the selective draft. or of the American Socialist, who with

Assistant District Attorney Fleming read extracts from numerous alleged anti-war articles from the files of the paper. One was signed by Victor L. Berger, another defendant, and en-titled: "If this be treason, make the most of it."

Engdahl said it had been taken from Engdahl said it had been taken from a book written by Berger several years ago, entitled "Berger's Broadsides."
Another article offered in evidence was entitled "The Navy Gives Receipts," and referred to the fact that window service flags for homes of men in the military service of the United States had been issued. It concluded with the inquiry: "How much longer will women continue to swap their husbands and sons for a gaudy nice of cardboard?" sons for a gaudy piece of cardboard?"
"The killing programme of the Government," was the caption of another article. "Come, ye slaves," was the title of an article against the selective draft

TEACHER SUES FOR SALARY

RIGHT OF BOARD TO FIX AMOUNT OF WAGE TESTED.

Controversy to Be Decided Is Whether Mrs. Eugenie Taggert Is Regular or Substitute Teacher.

Mrs. Eugenie H. Taggert, an Instructor in the Portland public schools, is plaintiff in a suit filed yesterday against the Board of Education for recovery of \$480, which, she says, is due as salary for the past the gular teacher at a monthly salary of \$160 a month.

The case is one which promises to develop widespread interest among the teachers of the city, inasmuch as School Clerk Thomas said yesterday the suit would be taken to the Supreme Court, if necessary, in order to test the validity of any order. validity of any order or abrogation of any order which the School Board

might desire to make.

According to Mr. Thomas, Mrs. Taggert is a substitute teacher and is on the payroll as a substitute teacher. Under a rule adopted by the School Board this Fall, all substitute teachers shall be paid \$5 a day for each day they actually serve. This is a radical change from the rule in effect last year and for several years past. Mra Taggert for the past three years

Mrs. Taggert for the past three years has been drawing \$160 a month, but under the new ruting of the School Board her monthly salary during the present school year has averaged less than \$100 a month. Mrs. Taggert has refused to accept the salary warrants which the School Board has proffered her, and the filing of the suit has been expected.


