

SOCIALISTS GIVE NO AID TO GOVERNMENT

Editor of Paper Makes Admission During Trial.

BERGER'S ARTICLES READ

J. Louis Engdahl Is Cross-Examined Regarding Contents of Publication.

CHICAGO, Dec. 23.—Under cross-examination today, J. Louis Engdahl, editor of the American Socialist, who with four others, is on trial before Judge Landis charged with violating the espionage law, admitted that he had never printed a line in the paper which might have aided the Government's successful prosecution of the war.

Assistant District Attorney Fleming read extracts from numerous anti-war articles from the files of the paper. One was signed by Victor L. Berger, another defendant, and entitled: "If this be treason, make the most of it."

Engdahl said it had been taken from a book written by Berger several years ago, entitled "Berger's Broadside."

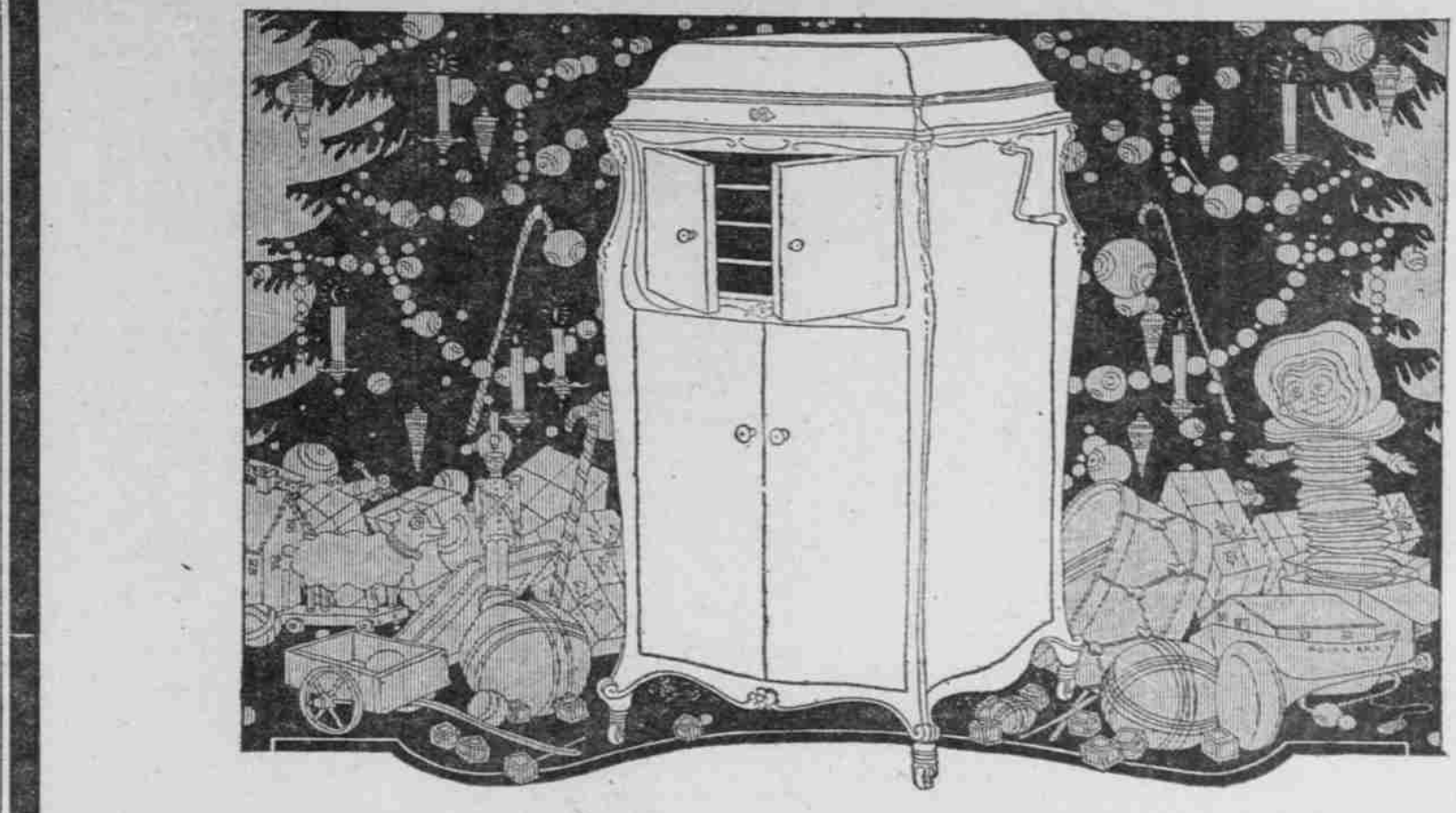

LANDMARK BEING REMOVED

WOODLAND Plans to Turn Channel of Lewis River.

WOODLAND, Wash., Dec. 23.—(Special.)—Harvey Riker, with a crew of men, has begun the removal of one of the well-known landmarks of this vicinity, Little Rock, a peak in Lewis River at the upper edge of town.

The work is being done to give the river at that point a straightway run from the bend above and force the stream into the old channel on the east.

HOOD RIVER GOES THE LIMIT.

HOOD RIVER, Ore., Dec. 23.—(Special.)—Hood River County will go the limit in road construction and improvement next year, as a result of the action of the budget meeting today.

Although it had originally been planned to decrease taxes the coming year as a result of the ending of the war they will be increased 6 per cent, the maximum under the law. The total of the increase \$4800, will be used for road work. The budget contains a special fund of \$2750 for opening a road to Lost Lake.

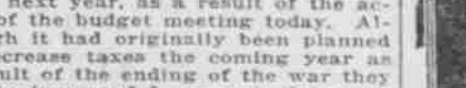


WOODLAND Has Heavy Frost.
