MANY FAMILIES QUARANTINED .- Approximately 450 families were forced to spend Christmas confined to their homes because of the Spanish influenza quarantine. All cases of the disease wore subject to a five days' quarantine and in all these cases only the breadwinner of the family is permitted to go and come. No statistics were avail-able yesterday as the Health Bureau was closed. Indications during the past few days point to a rapid decline in the spread of the disease, which is said to be due primarily to the quarantine of the individual cases of influenza.

PRISONERS' CHRISTMAS QUIET .-- Prison-ers in both the county and city jails here celebrated Christmas quietly yesterday and displayed their holiday spirit only when special Christmas din-ners were set before them. from all parts of the globe, and in dis-patching Portland's gifts to persons re-siding at distant points. The volume of incoming Christmas mail this year far outstripped that of any previous year, but, according to Postmaster Myers, every Christmas package which reached the city yes-terday or before will have been de-livered by nightfall today. The Christmas postal rush centered at the new postoffice, whence approxi-mately 60,000 packages have been de-livered since Monday morning.

Inverse since Monday morning. On Monday a total of 337,700 letters and postal card greetings were can-celed in the postoffice amid the out-going mail, and more than one-third of a million letters and postal cards were received for delivery in all parts of the city on the same day. business. Postmaster Myers points to the special delivery department, which during the last three days has handled 12 times as much business daily as in

12 times as much business daily as in normal times. Postal receipts for the Christmas business were 12 per cent greater this year than at any previous time in the history of the office, according to Postmaster Myers. Monday, December 22, was the banner day, when the re-ceipts exceeded the receipts of any single day in the history of the Post-land office.


