LETTER TELLS OF SUICIDE

OREGONIAN RECEIVES NOTE REGARDING PURPOSE.

Sheriff Hurlburt Unable to Find the Family of James D. Atherton, Whose Name Is Signed.

"And should my body by some misfortune come to the surface, I hope you will give it a decent burial and plant the big white rose on the left side of the walk at the head of my grave in memory of the few happy years that I spent with you in our little home upon this earth."

This is the parting message of a letter penned, it is believed, by James D. Atherton, of Milwaukie, to his wife, Geneva Atherton, a few hours before he committed suicide.

The pre-arranged suicide is dramatically explained in a letter received by The Oregonian from a man signing the name of James D. Atherton, box 1, route 1, Milwaukie, Or.

Sheriff Hurlburt yesterday had deputies making an investigation in an effort to learn whether or not the letter is genuine. Deputies could find no one who knew a family by the name of Atherton living in the vicinity of Milwaukie.

Sheriff Hurlburt has notified Sheriff Wilson, of Clatsop County, and intends prosecuting his investigation again today.
