LEADERS IN RANKS OF ORGANIZED LABOR PROMINENT IN SIXTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OREGON STATE FEDERATION OF LABOR, MEETING IN PORTLAND.

Appointment of Committees Occupies First Day.

### RECONSTRUCTION PLANS UP

### Compensation Law to Be Subject of Much Discussion; Russian Intervention Opposed.

Reconstruction and legislation were the two subjects that loomed prominently in the first day's session of the 16th annual meeting of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, which con vened yesterday at Auditorium Hall. A committee on reconstruction, conelsting of seven members, was among the first appointed by O. E. Hibbs, vicepresident, who is presiding in the absence of President Hartwig, and was the only committee named aside from the usual convention organization.

The laws and legislation committee was composed of 15 members, and will have the task of formulating views of the representatives of labor on existing laws and needed enactment.

### 140 in Attendance.

The morning scission was devoted to the appointment of the regular com-mittees and that on reconstruction, after which adjournment was taken to 5 oclock F. M. The credentials com-mittee received certificates of the delegates and made up the roll of members entitled to participate in the delibera-tions. Up to adjournment yesterday afternoon the names of more than 140 delegates had been certified to the roll. Half of the time of the sessions yes-terday was devoted to election of mem-

bars of two committees. An hour was occupied in debate upon a motion to make the selection of members of additional committées appointive instead of elective. This was strongly opposed by delegates who argued that it was undemocratic to empower the presiding officer to appoint committees. Dis-cueston centered upon the varied def-initions of "democracy" by individual antions of demotracy of indications delegates, and the purpose of the mo-tion to secure economy in time and expedite dispatch of business was lost when the motion was tabled. The reconstruction committee, to which was referred many suggestions and processils is command of the foi-


### Compensation Law Up.

It became apparent from early dis-cussion relative to committees and resolutions and documents introduced and referred to committees that the state compensation law will be a sub-ject of extended consideration. Amend-ments to the laws governing the Industrial Accident Commission are pro-posed and the committee on that sub-ject is expected to recommend new leg-

One resolution referred to the con mittee demands amnesty for all po-litical primoners and violators of the espionage laws now that war is ended. This recommendation came from G. T Hunt, of Bend, and calls attention to the sentences of 10 years for Eugene V. Debs and Rose Pastor Stokes as compared with a four-year sentence in Germany for Karl Liebknecht, convicted of high treason. The State Federation took no action on the suggestions, nor were they discussed, but the resolu tions committee will have the matter before it for consideration. Another resolution by Mr. Hunt opposes intervention of the United States in Russia, as opposed to the declaration of President Wilson May 26, 1917, and also opposes allied intervention. A committee of five was elected to recommend the action that the Fedcration should take in regard to the appeals from the International Worka' Defense League in behalf of homas Mooney. Telegrams were received from O. P. Hoff, State Treasurer, who expressed regret at his inability to be present, having attended every session while having attended every session while he was Labor Commissioner. Presi-dent Otto Hartwig, who is in Wash-ington, D. C. in behalf of the grant-ing of permission by the Shipping Board for building of wood ships, also wirsd his regrets.
