Tinker intimated that the National Association of Miner Leagues would break from the major leagues if the break from the major leagues it the request for emancipation from the draft is turned down. He admitted, however, that the major leagues have shown a conciliatory attitude to the minor leagues. He said the National Commission agreed to limit the number of players that could be drafted to one from each minor league club and also expressed a willingness to reduce the number of players a big league club the number of players a big league club could let out under optional agreement from eight to two. This, however, is not satisfactory to the minors who want to have all drafts and optional agreements eliminated from baseball

The few major league magnates who were among the early arrivals refused to discuss the situation other than to say that the matter would be given eareful study, and that minor leaguers
