ELECTION IN BERLIN FOLLOWED BY RIOTS

Returns for National Assembly Show Socialist Vote Large.

OLD PARTY DISAPPEARS

Streets of Berlin Virtually Buried Under Deluge of Election Dodgers and Posters.

LONDON, Jan. 20.—Rioting occurred in Berlin during last night after the Spartacists had attempted to destroy the ballot boxes used in Sunday's election, according to an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Copenhagen.

The Spartacists were repulsed everywhere. Fighting took place in Wilhelmstrasse and Kiedemannstrasse and at the Halleische Tor. The Spartacists also made an attempt to storm the office of the "Vorwaerts."

"The course of the elections throughout the German state," says a German government wireless dispatch received here tonight, "has clearly proved that the development of a republican form of government interests the whole German nation."

PARIS, Jan. 20.—Returns of the election for the German National Assembly for the Third Electoral District of Baden show the majority Socialists to have won five seats, the Centrist party five seats, the German Nationalist party one seat and the German Democratic party three seats.

socialists Lead Strongly. In the Karlsruhe district the majority Socialists cast 24,887 votes, the Centrists 14,570, the Nationalists 832 and the German Democrats 2,482.

In Mannheim: Centrists, 18,765; German Nationalists, 6,097; German Democrats, 2,652.

In Lorrach, Baden: Centrists, 3,652; German Nationalists, 1,444; German Democrats, 872; majority Socialists, 10,944.

At Waldshut the result was: Majority Socialists, 3,334; Centrists, 997; German Nationalists, 147; German Democrats, 232.

At Sackingen: Majority Socialists, 2,809; Centrists, 1,200; German Nationalists, 49; German Democrats, 1091.

At Constance: Socialists, 12,249; Centrists, 15,774; German Nationalists, 968; German Democrats, 871.

Wuerttemberg's Results Given. The results in Wuerttemberg were: Majority Socialists, 470,316 votes and seven seats; German Democrats, 332,019 votes and four seats; Centrists, 303,050 votes and four seats.

In Mecklenburg and Lubeck the Socialists secured three seats, the Democrats and the Nationalists one.

At Frankfurt-on-the-Main the Independent Socialists, so far as counted, polled 77,900 votes; Democrats, 28,000; Centrists, 19,000; People's party, 14,000; Majority Socialists, 74,000; Nationalists, 4,000.

At Danzig the People's party polled 11,700; Centrists, 12,300; Democrats, 23,000; Independent Socialists, 6,800. These returns are incomplete.

At Madagburg the Nationalists polled 9,919; People's party, 7,205; Centrists, 2,514; Democrats 4,224. The majority parties polled 103,453; minorities 10,427.

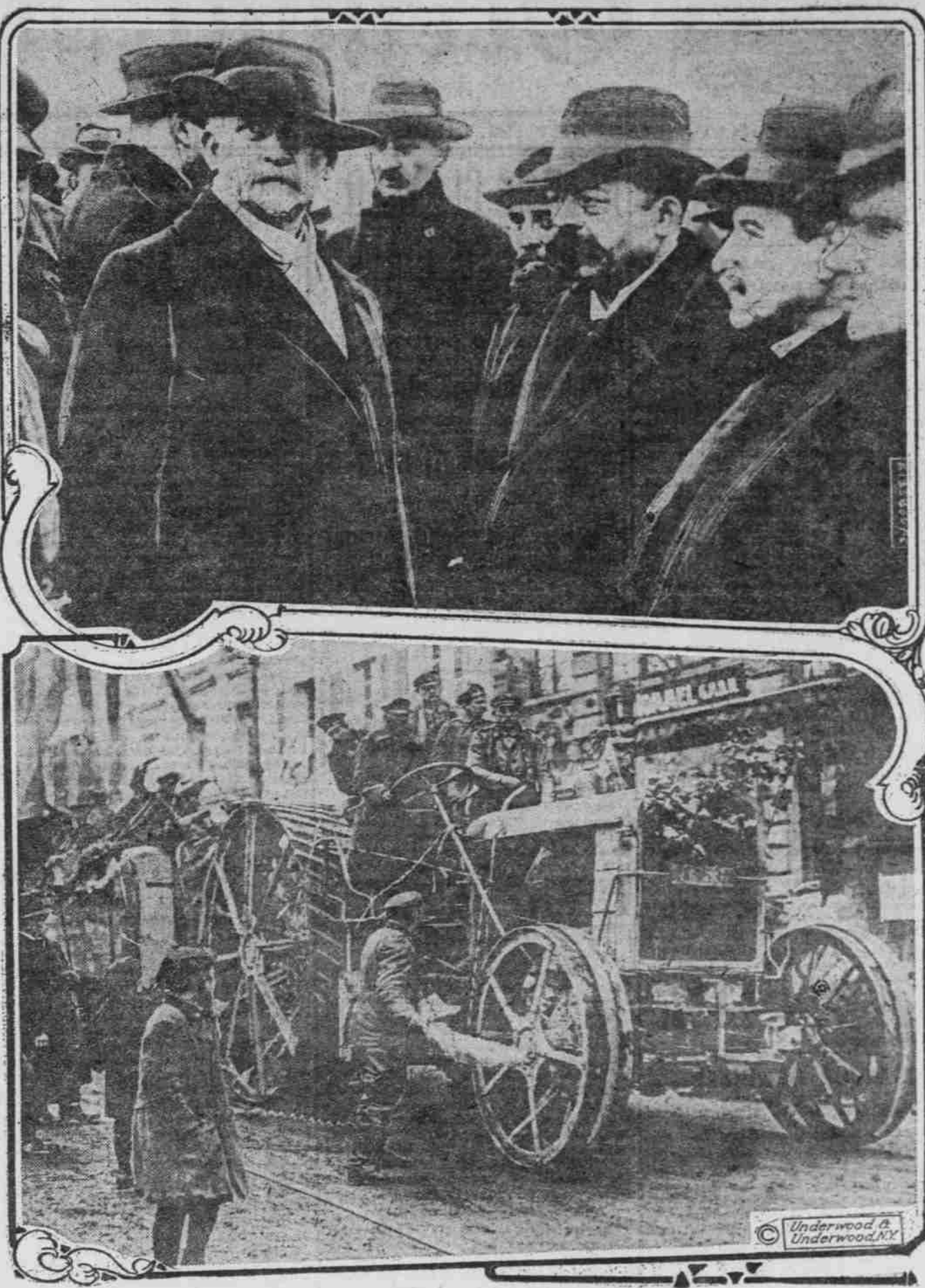
At Elberfeld the Nationalists and People's party secured 22,128; Centrists, 11,977; Democrats, 9,850; the majority parties 35,023, the minorities 7,254.

BERLIN, Jan. 19, 11:30 P. M.—(By the Associated Press).—Twenty-four of the 831 election districts in Greater Berlin give the following totals: German Democratic party, 737; Majority Socialists, 519; Independent Socialists, 3,005; German Nationalist party, 4,706; German People's party, 2,990; Christian (Centrist) party, 2,254.

Berlin Plastered With Posters. The streets of Berlin today were virtually buried under a deluge of election dodgers, white fronts of houses and available windows were plastered with huge posters hung up by campaign workers during the morning frequently without the knowledge of house or store proprietors.

The spectacle was one wholly new to Berlin, where the billboard privileges are strictly confined to the familiar columns on the street corners, while the distribution of handbills is ordinarily severely restricted by police regulations.

Today, however, the house and shop fronts on Unter den Linden from the Pariserplatz to the opera house were one continuous billboard appeal. The majority Socialists alone are reported to have distributed 30,000,000 dodgers in addition to wall papering the city with myriads of posters.

BERNE, Switzerland, Jan. 20.—Socialists in Hungary, according to the Hungarian Press Bureau, have entered a Cabinet headed by former Minister of Justice Herriky to collaborate with the non-Socialist parties.

PRISONERS TO BE FED

RELIEF WILL BE GIVEN TO RUSSIANS IN GERMANY.

Steamer Loaded With Supplies to Go to Copenhagen; Conditions Said to Be Very Bad.

PARIS, Jan. 20.—The American Red Cross will begin immediately the work of providing relief for Russian prisoners in Germany, who are said to number 1,800,000. Large sums of money have been contributed for this purpose by Russian societies and individuals in France and Scandinavian countries.

Captain Webster, of the American Red Cross, is in London supervising the loading of the steamer Nero with shoes, blankets and clothing. The vessel will start for Copenhagen in a few days. Negotiations have been completed with Herbert C. Hoover, director-general of relief, who will supply food up to the limit of the money subscribed for the relief of Russian prisoners through Rotterdam and Copenhagen.

This relief work possibly is the result of a clause in the new armistice conditions and will be under the general supervision of Brigadier-General Harries of the American Army, who is in Berlin in connection with the repatriation of American prisoners.

The Russian military prisoners in Germany total 1,200,000, while the civilians number 200,000. Sanitary conditions among the Russians are said to be very bad.

The Red Cross is sending hospital and disinfecting units and kitchens and canteens with the first relief ship. It is reported that more than 100,000 Russian prisoners are in hospitals.

Houseboat Occupant Found Dead.

The dead body of August Augustine, 43, was found in his houseboat near the Columbia River slough late yesterday by neighbors. Persons residing in an adjoining houseboat reported to Deputy Coroner Leo Goetsch, who investigated the cause of the death, that he was last seen by them Sunday afternoon. The deceased was single and had no known relatives. The coroner reported that death resulted from natural causes, and no inquest will be held. The body is at the county morgue.

Banks May Apply Earnings.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—A bill introduced by Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, was passed by the Senate today to permit Federal reserve banks to apply their earnings to an increase of their surplus until it equals 100 per cent of their capital instead of 40 per cent, the present limit. The measure was introduced at the request of the Federal Reserve Board.

O'LEARY'S AIDE IS ACCUSED

J. W. ROBINSON IS CHARGED WITH TREASON.

Correspondence in Invisible Ink Alleged to Have Been Delivered to Hun Agent in 1917.

NEW YORK, Jan. 20.—J. Willard Robinson, formerly a stenographer in the office of Jeremiah A. O'Leary, is accused of carrying messages between O'Leary and German agents in Holland in 1917, in an indictment for treason returned here today by the Federal grand jury.

Robinson, the indictment states, went to Rotterdam on an American tank steamer in April, 1917, and delivered to Frank Richards, alleged to be a German agent, correspondence from O'Leary and from Madame Marie de Victoria, John T. Ryan and Herman Wessels, who, with O'Leary, were indicted last Spring on charges of conspiracy to commit treason and espionage.

In June of the same year, it is charged, Robinson arrived here with secret correspondence. The messages, the indictment states, were in invisible ink and one from O'Leary and Ryan asked the German government what assistance it could give the fight for freedom in Ireland.

The indictment contains copies of letters which Robinson is said to have brought from Holland and also from Spain and Denmark, and which were intercepted by the Army intelligence bureau.

Robinson was one of six persons indicted last year with O'Leary on the charge of conspiracy and espionage charges. Madame de Victoria, who is said to be the Baroness Maria von Kretschmann, daughter of the former German Emperor, and Wessels, a lieutenant commander in the German navy and also known as Carl Rodiger, are in custody, German spies: Ryan, whose home is

in Buffalo, is believed to have fled to Mexico.

Owing to the absence of Ryan, it is said, the case has not yet been brought to trial. O'Leary, a prisoner in the Tombs, has been tried on a charge of conspiracy to obstruct the nation's military preparations by means of articles in the anti-British magazine Bull.

Owing to his illness, the case did not go to the jury. On the eve of an earlier date set for trial of this indictment, O'Leary made his sensational flight to the Pacific Coast and soon after his capture was arraigned on the charge involving conspiracy to commit treason. Robinson formerly was an employe of Bull.

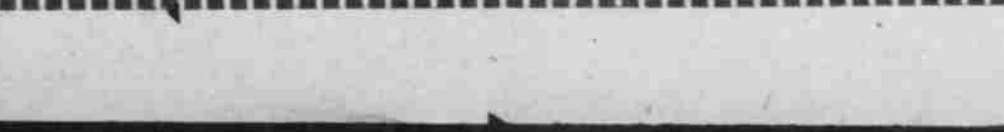
