WHITE WAY CAUSES THEFT

MISSING NEW YORK YOUTH TAKES \$350,000 IN BONDS.

Brothers Are Arrested and Held on Suspicion of Having Been Implicated.

**NEW YORK.**—The lure of the "great White Way," according to the police, was responsible for an alleged robbery of \$350,000 worth of bonds by a youth of 19, Cornelius Cregan, from the stock brokerage firm of McClure, Jones & Read, of 115 Broadway.  
 Cregan has not yet been arrested, but his brother Lester and James J. Tunney, both 20, were taken into custody, the former at 499 Eagle avenue, Bronx, and the latter at 752 West End avenue, on suspicion of having been implicated in the alleged crime.  
 The police charge that Cornelius Cregan stole the bonds a few hours after he had obtained employment as a runner for the firm. They say he began work at 9 o'clock December 30 and at 2 o'clock that afternoon was sent to the Bank of Commerce with 60 \$1000 Liberty bonds, 200 bonds of General Motors, 200 of Ohio City Gas, 100 of Reading Railway, 100 of Republic Iron and Steel, 20 of United States Steel and 100 of American Locomotive, which were never delivered.  
 According to police all the bonds were negotiable and a close search is now being made for the certificates. Detectives who examined Lester Cregan at headquarters say he admitted receiving \$45,000 worth of bonds from Cornelius, which were sold to a broker at 125th street and Park avenue for \$225, payment being made with \$50 in cash and a check for \$175. The name of the seller was not given. It was also stated that young Tunney was given \$300 and that he had \$270 of this when arrested.  
 The arresting officers say Cornelius

Cregan has been living away from home for several months and staying in Broadway hotels, where the expenses were far above his ordinary income.  
 For three years he was employed by the brokerage firm of Dominick & Dominick, the police say, and bore a high reputation there for industry and honesty.

SONS OF DEMOCRACY START Spokane Chapter, No. 1, Great War Veterans, Organize.

**SPOKANE, Wash.**—Spokane chapter No. 1, Sons of Democracy, Great War Veterans, is the name of an organization of returned soldiers which has been formed here. According to the by-laws, which have been approved by the executive committee of the association, honorably discharged officers and enlisted men of the Army, Navy men or Marine Corps who served in the world war are eligible to membership.  
 The purpose of the organization is declared to be "to bind together the honorably discharged veterans who shall further the welfare of the government, both in a political and an economic way, and to further the mutual interests of the members." Each member must take an oath to support the Constitution of the United States and the articles of war.  
 Local backers of the organization hope to widen its scope to include chapters throughout the Nation.
