FORMER DIAGONAL PLAN PER-MITTED IN SPECIFIED AREA.

Children Prohibited From Roller Skating on Pavements in the Congested District.

Amendments were made yesterday by the City Council to the present traf-fic law which will allow the diagonal parking of automobiles between Sixth street and Broadway on the south side of Pine and on the north side of Ankeny streets, and on both sides of Sixth sixest from Pine street to the south line of Burnside street.

This amendment was made after an investigation by the City Council, which proved that the old method of

which proved that the old method of parking in this area would not in any way obstruct traffic. Another amendment to the new law prohibits automobiles from parking on Washington street from Fifth to Park streets between 7 P. M. and 11 P. M. The law formerly covered Washington street from Fifth to Tenth streets.

Roller skating within the congested district, which includes all territory from the river to Tenth street, Taylor to Oak streets, is prohibited under the provisions of the amended ordinance. Complaint was made to the Council by traffic officials that hundreds of children were skating in the busy, congested district. A campaign of education within the schools will be used as a means of enlightening the children to this requirement of the law.

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
