

VOCATIONAL TRAINING OPENED TO WOUNDED

Soldiers Here to Get Compensation During Courses.

FEDERAL DIRECTOR ARRIVES

E. G. Cox Opens Office in Gasco Building to Give Information on Preparations for Positions.

Wounded soldiers returned to Portland will be able to secure immediate aid in vocational training which will fit them for positions. They will be paid for the entire time spent in training and positions will be secured for them.

First-hand action on all these cases will be made possible by the coming to Portland of E. G. Cox, representing the Federal Board for Vocational Training.

Soldiers who are unable to apply direct to Mr. Cox every Monday and Wednesday, on which days he will be in Portland, beginning tomorrow, Mr. Cox will confer with the joint committee and the governing committee of the home service section of the Red Cross on Wednesday, at 11 A. M.

The Red Cross is especially interested, for it has received from Red Cross field agents of various hospitals the names and addresses of a large number of discharged wounded soldiers, for whom it was advisable that vocational training be secured.

During the time a disabled man is following a course of instruction with the Federal Board he will, if a married man, without dependents, or if a man required by his course of instruction to live apart from dependents, be paid by the Government a total of \$65 a month, and in no case less than he received for his last month in service.

Training Open to Men.

If married he and his wife will receive \$75 a month, provided they are living together during the instruction. If they have to live apart the Government will pay the man \$65 a month and his wife \$10 a month, according to the number of children.

Commissioned officers may take the training and receive the same pay as the last month in service. They shall be glad to discuss with disabled men the training they may take. But practically anything they may choose is open to them.

Mr. Cox later will visit other cities in Oregon and will also be at Vancouver, B. C.

Mr. Cox is a former associate professor at the University of Washington and has done a great deal of vocational work.

TRAIN SERVICE IS STOPPED

Second Downpour in Lewis County

Damages Bridges.

MORTON, Wash., Jan. 24.—(Special.)—Transportation facilities to Eastern Lewis County were just about to resume normal conditions, after the floods the latter part of last week, when another downpour came. The Tacoma Eastern Railroad bridge at Park Junction was put out of use by the first high water and for two or three days there was no mail service from Eatonville, so that it will likely be the first of next week before any kind of mail or train service is resumed.

Advices from Eatonville Wednesday were to the effect that one small bridge south of Eatonville had gone out and that another was threatened.

SINNOTT'S AID IS SOUGHT

Hood River Club Seeks Revival of Buildings Appropriations.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Jan. 27.—(Special.)—The Hood River Commercial Club has sent a telegram to Representative N. J. Sinnott, whose attitude on the proposed revival of a Congressional public buildings appropriation is characterized by a Washington dispatch as positive, urging him to support the measure, which carries an appropriation of \$50,000 for a local postoffice building.

The telegram calls attention to a marked change in local conditions. From a general standpoint, the appropriations measure is supported in Congress for the purpose of providing work for returned soldiers.
