

FOR THE LIVES OF... FUND OF \$250,000 WILL BE COLLECTED IN NORTHWEST.

PORTLAND WILL BE SITE... DIRECTORS OF PACIFIC INTERNATIONAL LIVESTOCK EXPOSITION DECIDE TO INAUGURATE CAMPAIGN.

Directors of the Pacific International Livestock Exposition, in session yesterday, decided upon immediate steps for financing the plans for the erection of a suitable building to house the annual show.

The plans contemplate a building that will cover seven and one-half acres of ground, occupying a plot of 15 acres of ground that will allow a space for at least 250,000 feet of parking automobiles.

Plans were approved by the directors for launching an immediate campaign to drive in the state outside of Portland, in Washington, Idaho and California to raise a fund, the minimum amount of which will not be less than \$150,000.
