SOLDIER AID IS INDORSED

Oregon Hotel Men's Association Approves Road Programme.

Telegrams were yesterday sent to Oregon's members of Congress by the Hotel Men's Association, asking them to support the measure providing that civilian clothing and six months' pay shall be given discharged soldiers at the time of their release from the Army.

The association also received reports from its committee on state aid for soldiers. The meeting adopted a resolution offered by Mark Woodruff, of the Multnomah, and Phil Metschan, Jr., of the Imperial, which puts the hotel men on record in support of the plan to appropriate \$10,000,000 for road work
