The effort at reconsideration developed a long debate on technicalities relative to the rules, and the speaker held that on a reconsideration of a bill which has been indefinitely postponed a suspension of the rules is necessary, which requires a two-thirds affirmative vote. > Deficiency Appropriation Cut. The house also passed senate bill 12 which legalizes drugless healing. The senate this afternoon reduced Scaretary of State I. M. Howell's deficiency appropriation of \$24,567 to \$4,922, after which the bill passed. Secretary Howell asked the appropriation as absolutely necessary to carry the automobile license department to April 1. His estimate of \$430,000 for the expense of the license department for the next two years has been under hostile scrutiny ever since the legislature conscrutiny ever since the tegislature con-vened. It is understood that the \$490,-000 estimate will be reduced to \$150,000 before an omnibus appropriation is finally made for the license depart-

nent.
