CITY MOVES TO TAKE **UP PAVING MEASURE**

Three Bids, Indicating Close Combine, Rejected.

The bids in question were rejected upon the joint recommendation of City Commissioners Perkins and Barbur because each bid was identical, and, ac carding to Commissioner Barbur, were indicative of a "close combine estab-lished for the sole purpose of boosting prices of materials necessary in the operation of the city's paving-repair plant."

City to Take Steps.

Following the reading of a report from Commissioner Perkins, city purchasing agent, recommending the re-jection of all bids offered, City Com-missioner Bigelow stated that this was not the first instance of paving firms entering into combines for the purpose

entering into combines for the purpose of boosting prices. "Many times it has come to my no-tice that certain firms in this city," said Commissioner Bigelow, "have pooled together and set certain prices on materials or work. These combines cannot exist iong, and I would recom-mend that Commissioner Barbur be in-structed to take steps to make possible the entry of the city into the paving business."

Bids Indicate Combine.

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"We are already working on such a plan," explained Commissioner Barbur. plan," explained Commissioner Barbur, "We have several sites in view to be used as bunkers, and I believe that we can enter into agreement with the Port of Portland for all the sand and gravel which we would need. "These three bids for sand, gravel and crushed rock," he continued, "are identical, indicative of an agreement between the various contracting con-cerns. The prices have been boosted in

between the various contracting con-cerns. The prices have been boosted in the case of sand, for instance, 300 per cent of what they were during the past year. In view of the fact that the city can secure the same prices, if not lower once, in the open market. I favor the rejection of these bids. It is not neces-sary for the city of Portland to bow to the edict of any combine."

City Has Own Repair Plant.

The three bids, which were rejected by unanimous vote of the council, were offered by the Columbia Digger com-pany, Star Sand company and Nickum & Follow

& Kelly. At the present time the city operates a paving-repair plant, confining its work to the repair of streets on which the private contractor's maintenance agreements have expired. The city has done several paving jobs on property owned by the city, such as Terwilliger boulevard, and in several instances in which property owners paid cash for the work.


