

SENATOR EDDY URGES \$3,000,000 IN BONDS

Reconstruction Bill Held Solution of Oregon's Future.

MANY PROJECTS INCLUDED

Proposed Bonds Will Draw 4 1/2 Per Cent Interest and Run for 25 Years.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Feb. 13.—(Special.)—Assurance of \$3,000,000 in reconstruction bonds to be used in the construction of state buildings and in other projects designed to assist returned soldiers and sailors is the purpose of a bill introduced today by Chairman Eddy of the senate reconstruction committee.

Special Session Eliminated. In the introduction of these twin measures Senator Eddy contends that the necessity of a special legislative session in May will be eliminated.

The bill gives the board of control supervision over the sale of the reconstruction bonds and gives to the same board authority over the public works after the bonds have been sold and the construction of public buildings started.

A temporary commissioner of public works, who shall have direct supervision over all construction work, is authorized under the terms of the bill. He shall be appointed by the board of control.

Sale of Bonds Provided. It is provided that the bonds shall not bear more than 4 1/2 per cent interest and shall mature within 25 years from the date of their issue.

One-half of this amount is to be spent in the construction of a new penitentiary building and the other \$500,000 shall be used in other construction work, which Senator Eddy has not specified in the bill.

Another \$500,000 is sought to carry out the provisions of the settlement act, a bill which Senator Eddy introduced two weeks ago.

There are some who believe that the legislature should make a direct appropriation measure which they would then submit to the people at a special time election.

GASOLINE TAX IS PASSED

HOUSE PROVIDES FOR REVENUE FOR GOOD ROADS.

One Cent a Gallon and Half a Cent on Distillate Will Raise About \$350,000 Annually.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Feb. 13.—(Special.)—The house this morning passed the bill of the roads and highways committee providing for imposition of a tax of 1 cent a gallon on gasoline and a half a cent on distillate.

Chairman Dennis of the roads and highways committee explained the bill will raise about \$350,000 in revenue, of this \$10,500 coming from gasoline and the balance from distillate.

Brand and Lafferty voted against the bill due to the distillate provision.

FISHING BILL ON CALENDAR

Rogue River Measure Seems Assured of Passage.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Feb. 13.—(Special.)—The Rogue river fish bill won its way to the calendar this afternoon with sufficient votes to pass it, if the lineup remains the same when it comes up on third reading.

Optometrist Regulation Proposed. STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Feb. 13.—(Special.)—Stricter regulations are thrown about optometrists and no store can sell glasses or replace lenses unless it has the work done by a registered optometrist under provisions of a bill by Representative Coffey passing the house today.

School Tax Bill Presented. STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Feb. 13.—(Special.)—School boards of the first class are empowered to levy taxes without the formality of an election, under the provisions of a bill by Representative Smith of Baker, which passed the house today.

The senate passed the alien labor bill as redrafted by the judiciary committee. Restrictions against aliens contractually licensed are eliminated, but contracts for public work are rendered void when the contractor employs any foreign-born laborer who claimed alien exemption in order to avoid military service.

Buildings Appropriation Asked. The house today passed the senate bill which appropriates \$3,500,000 for capital buildings and \$50,000 for a monument to soldiers and sailors of the war. The vote was 80 to 6.

The capitol grants total 132,000 acres. Representative Reed said these grants will build all the capitol buildings and furnish a surplus the interest on which will perpetually maintain the buildings.

CITY ELECTIONS REGULATED. Legislature Asked to Effect Saving by Consolidations.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Or., Feb. 13.—(Special.)—Senator Handley today introduced a bill providing for carrying out the provisions of the constitutional amendment passed in 1917, providing for state county and city elections being held at the same time.
