

CLEMENCEAU ATTACK HALTS WORLD PEACE

France at Loss for Leader if Premier Should Succumb.

NO SUCCESSOR IN SIGHT

M. Briand's Name is Most Frequently Mentioned, but None Meets Public Expectation.

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PARIS, Feb. 20.—(Special Cable.)—When Premier Georges Clemenceau was shot the world's peace was staggered. Although the wound was assumed to be mortal it did not kill the "Tiger" the effect upon France is even more serious than upon her leader, however light the surgeons may report the wound to be. For France is suffering from the weight of four years of invasion and hardship and is nervous and unsettled. This stroke at her strongest figure is a double blow at her very heart.

Her condition reacts directly upon the progress of the peace conference. The confidence that a country felt under the hand of the premier in discharging, and she feels herself under the necessity of going slowly for fear of making mistakes.

If Premier Clemenceau should die, who will succeed him? Search for available candidates reveals few, if any, who command public faith to a degree at all comparable to that which the premier possesses. M. Briand's name is most frequently heard in this relation. Andre Tardieu is also mentioned. Albert Thomas is in the list, but it may be doubted if the bourgeoisie or French in general is ready to make such concession at this time to radical socialism. M. Klotz also is mentioned, but his association with financial interests is scarcely calculated to bring him support based on public trust.

The premier's incapacity comes at an awkward moment in relation to two matters of prime importance, one of them dealing with Russia and the other with reparations. I can say positively that the Russian conference plan has taken on new life, and that meetings will begin at Brinkley even though the Russians may attempt them except the bolshevik.

The matter of reparations reveals an impasse as to the construction of the term "reparation," upon which the principle of German payment rests. The committee in charge of the work has sent a message to President Wilson asking for his definition of the term as used in his 14 points of peace, and at the same time it has referred the question to the supreme interallied council, which accepted the 14 points, with reservations as to reparations and as to freedom of the seas.

America's position is opposed to those of both Great Britain and France, who demands cover full costs of the war and amends for all damage inflicted, while our claims are confined to actual damages, under the committee's definition of President Wilson's principle. Arguments have continued for two weeks and no solution seems near.

American members stress the fact that they do not oppose full demands on Germany, but they are averse to asking amounts beyond the possibility of actual payment. For in that case Germany might throw her hands on the table and refuse to take part in the game. Then the necessity would be created of trying to collect by force, a course that would require immense armies, and would be tantamount to continued state of war for years to come, with little prospect of accomplishing the purpose at the end of the effort.

The British are committed to extreme claims by election pledges and by recent utterances in the house of commons, while the French authorities have promised their people amounts that are hardly within the realm of possibility.
