Salem and Seattle Men Discharged Without Funds.

BRAKEMEN FORGET ORDERS

Have Novel Experience Following Service in Navy.

Forced to choose between going to sea for a period of from three to six hooths longer after serving faithfully in the navy for 29 months, or accepting their discharges thousands of miles from home without money or transportation tickets to get them there; L. E. Peterson of Seattle, Wash, and Fred Boatwright of Salem, Or., chose the latter and arrived in Portland last Sunday after "beating their way" from Port Arthur, Texas, where they left the ship.

After they arrived in Portland, Fer-dinand E. Reed and Mrs. Reed, in charge of the Red Cross canteen at the Union depot, secured positions for the boys in a Portland shippard, where they earned enough money to carry them to their homes from here in tourist instead of hoho style. They left last night for their homes.

Money Does Not Arrive.

When the U. S. S. Cuyama, on which the two youths had sailed nine times back and forth between the East coast of the United States and England and France, docked at Fort. Arthur, Texas, they were given their discharges, but the money which should have been at that port for their transportation.

France, docked at Port Arthur, Texas, they were given their discharges, but the money which should have been at that port for their transportation home, was not there.

They waited until the ship was ordered back to sea, but still the money had not arrived. The commanding officer then informed them that in order to be fully discharged from the service they must waive all claim to transportation to their home port and testify that they had enough money in their pockets to get them there, or else go back to sea for an indefinite period.

They boarded a troop train at Port Arthur and traveled with it as far as Sugarman, Texas, near San Antonio, when they were forced to get off following the discovery by the conductor that there were 21 men in his car instead of 20, as the Government had told itim.

The boys hiked from there, according to Peterson, into San Antonio, where they boarded a cattle train which carried them as far as El Pase. They rode on the top of passenger cars from there to Los Angeles and from that place to Portland on top of a number of different freight, parsenger and troop trains.

Brakemen Are Sympathetic.

Brakemen all along the road, says Peterson, treated them "magnificently," resulting their trying circumstances, and that were allowed to ride long

Brakemen all along the road, says Peterson, treated them "magnificently," resilizing their trying circumstances, and they were allowed to ride long distances without any orders to get off. When they finally arryled in Portland at 1 o'clock Sunday afterneon, both had completely exhausted the fund of \$18.80 which was given them when they were discharged from the navy.

Peterson enlisted on June 4, 1917, and was a water-tender on the U.S. S. Cuyama. He tells 67 seeing five submarines at one time, all of which disappeared when the third shot fired by the Cuyama hit one of the U-boats squarrely in the center.


