

BERLIN GOVERNMENT APPEALS TO YOUTHS

Youngsters Urged to Help in Saving Fatherland.

REDS MUST BE KEPT DOWN

Minister of Defense Threatens Severe Penalties for Any Interference With Traffic.

BERLIN, March 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—Although the recent Spartacist uprising was put down, the government, far from relaxing its vigilance, is already taking measures to prevent a repetition. The Prussian minister of education, Herr Haselbach, has issued an eloquent appeal to young collegians to join the volunteer corps "to save the fatherland, against which bolshevism threatens in the east, while the hydra of anarchy and civil warfare raises its head at home."

The minister of defense, Herr Noske, has issued a decree imposing up to one year's imprisonment for interference with street car employees or traffic, or sabotage of telegraph wires, cars, or other material. This is plainly intended to make it impossible for the minority of the street car men to prevent the majority from work in case of another strike.

Arms Importation Checked. Spartacist attempts to import arms from outside of Berlin are being checked by the military forces at various railroad stations, who have already confiscated a quantity of arms and ammunition.

BERLIN, March 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—During the debate in the chamber of the new Prussian diet over the question of a provisional constitution for Prussia, a conservative speaker argued in favor of providing for the office of president of Prussia in the new document. This was objected to by Paul Hirsch, head of the present cabinet, on the ground that to create a state executive would set an unfortunate example to the other federated states and likewise would be interpreted as an attempt to create a substitute for a monarch.

The party lineup in the new diet has not yet been determined. The present indications point to a working bloc of majority socialists and democrats, who jointly have a majority of 19 in the body.

Diet Building Guarded. A cordon of steel-helmeted troops was thrown around the diet buildings to protect the opening session. Only holders of credentials, which had been minutely examined, were permitted to pass after having been searched for weapons. This applied even to the women delegates.

What was once the defiant citadel of Prussian reactionaries has been converted into a democratic parliament. There was keen discussion in the house over civil war in Germany. The socialists proposed a parliamentary investigation, but were negated by the minister of justice, who later announced that the damage done to the Berlin police headquarters amounted to 20,000,000 marks.

The independent socialists demanded the confiscation of the private fortunes of the former emperor and his family.

LONDON, March 17.—Special dispatches from Berlin report that the suppression of the recent Spartacist outbreak there has shown that a military and monarchist reaction is growing and overshadowing the new government.

Ebert and Others Puppets. The Berlin correspondent of the Mail, who on February 27 sent a dispatch outlining plans for a monarchist uprising in Germany, has arrived in London, having left Berlin on March 14, after a residence there of three months. He reiterates the statements in his dispatch saying President Ebert, Chancellor Scheidemann and Minister of War Noske are merely puppets. He declares that for the purpose of retaining power they have allowed members of the military caste to reappear as organizers of the new republican armies.

"These men are the real governors of Germany," he says. "They make the edicts and Chancellor Scheidemann and his colleagues willingly sign them." Similar testimony is given by other correspondents in telegraphing from Berlin, some stating that the capture of the suburb of Lichtenberg has been intentionally prolonged with a view to exterminating the Spartacists, whose treatment at the hands of government troops is said to be sharply condemned. The correspondent concurs in the statement that extreme bitterness has been created against the government troops and that further trouble is inevitable.

Spartacists Not Finished. According to a dispatch to the Mail, the Spartacist revolt will certainly recur in ever-increasing force unless a miracle happens. It adds that Herr Noske's forces have been recruited by bribe and promise of a big ration and that to this may be attributed some of the food shortage in Berlin.

Under favorable conditions, Von Kuehlmann is quoted as saying, the Germans will be in Paris before 1925.

GERMANS ARE LOSING HOPE
Confidence in Government Declared to Be Waning.

PARIS, March 17.—A dispatch from the American legation at Copenhagen, dated March 11, and addressed to the American commission to negotiate peace was received today. It tells of the situation in Berlin, in part, as follows:

"The American military attaché's agent, who departed from Berlin last Thursday, has reported that the strikes which took place recently were primarily due to lack of work and food, but also partly to discontent brought about by delay by the government in socialistic action."

"The agent said that reports of bloodshed in Berlin were exaggerated. Hope of assistance from the allies and United States is dwindling. The result is reaction. Confidence in the government is at present being undermined rapidly and there is a tendency on the part of the people more and more to drift toward the left."

"The military attaché's agent made the statement that a further revolution, which would result in the present government's downfall, will result unless there is betterment of food deficiencies and industrial conditions within six weeks at the latest. Only the shipment of raw material and food to Germany will save the situation and prevent further revolution and disaster, the extent of which it is impossible to foresee."

Since the military attaché's agent left Berlin, which was on March 8, there has been considerable fighting in Berlin and its suburbs between the government forces and Spartacists. While some of the dispatches have reported heavy casualties during these troubles others have asserted that the reports of large numbers of persons having been killed or wounded were exaggerated.

Bramwell of Grants Pass will preside. Doran E. Yorlan of Eugene and Ben Sheldon, representative from Jackson and Josephine counties will be speakers. C. M. Ravlin has charge of the organization campaign in Hood River county. Saturday John L. Etheridge will visit North Bend and Marshfield and will address a joint meeting of chambers of commerce there that night. Senator W. T. Vinton of Minnville has taken charge of the work of raising the quota for Yamhill county.

There was a brief break in the drive yesterday, while Director Etheridge gave a practical demonstration of the sort of service the organization proposes to render its membership. He appeared on behalf of Mr. Common Citizen in opposition to the proposed increase in telephone rates at the hearing before the public service commission.

CITY OF PRZEMYSL IS TAKEN BY UKRAINIANS

Some Polish Troops Remain in Section of Town.

LEMBERG IS THREATENED

Lettish Headquarters Reports Capture of Important Place; Bolshevik Retreat Cut Off.

LONDON, March 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—Ukrainian troops have entered Przemyśl, according to a German wireless dispatch. The Poles are still in the northwestern part of the town.

The Ukrainians are also in the suburbs of Lemberg and along the whole Przemyśl-Lemberg line, traffic there being completely stopped.

COPENHAGEN, March 17.—An official communication issued by Lettish headquarters says: "Tuksum, 60 miles from Riga, has been captured. The bolshevik retreat in the whole of North Courland has been cut off. Lettish troops have reached Rilsden, in the center of North Courland."

WARSAW, Sunday, March 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—The bolshevik advance into the Ukraine is assuming serious proportions, according to advices from Stanislaw. The objective of the bolsheviks apparently is the old frontier line of Russia on the west. General Fedina's government is retreating from Winnitza to Ponurkovo, but the battle for the possession of Winnitza is continuing unabated.

BERLIN, Sunday, March 17.—(By the Associated Press.)—Dispatches to Berlin newspapers from Mrauden allege that the Poles are preparing for a general advance against the Germans, and have notified the German outposts that the armistice is no longer in effect. The dispatches say that the Poles are charged with 84 violations of the armistice.

The German authorities at Locken, it is added, have seized a secret depot of Polish war supplies.

Lemberg Faces Destruction.
A report from Upper Silesia says Lemberg is faced with destruction because of the Ukrainian bombardment. Large portions of Lemberg are in ruins. Numerous casualties are reported.

WASHINGTON, March 17.—Advices from Tiflis, in Trans-Caucasia, Russia, received at the state department by naval radio today, state that the conditions owing to lack of food in that region are becoming frightful. In Erivan it is reported that 45,000 are without bread and there is not even a dog, cat, horse, camel or any living thing in all the region about Igdir.

There is food at Baku and Barmu to feed the people for some time, but the railroads have not the facilities to transport it.

COPENHAGEN, March 17.—Lettish troops have advanced toward Mitau and have captured the towns of Kandau and Zabeln, according to a Lettish headquarters statement. The advance continues and the bolsheviks in northwestern Courland are threatened with having their retreat to Mitau and Riga cut off. They are reported to be retreating in panic.

Bolsheviks Meet Reverses.
A dispatch from Berlin quotes Libau advices to the effect that bolsheviks have been seriously defeated in the district between the city of Vilna and the important railroad running from Koshedary to Schaulen has been captured.

STOCKHOLM, Sunday, March 17.—The Lettish offensive in the Mitau region is developing successfully, the Lettish having captured Shagory, Grenzboff, Weitenfeld and Al Autz. The Lettish war minister has left the English

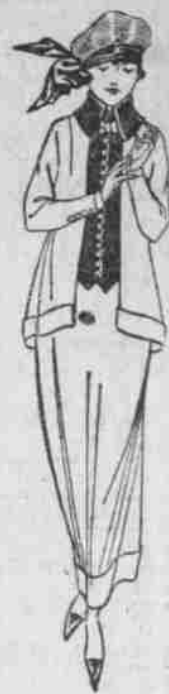

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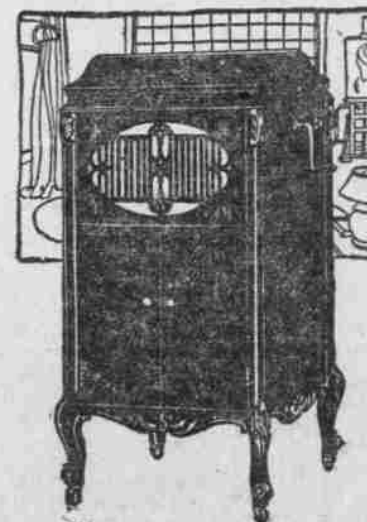
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
