

SHIPS PROMISED BY GERMANS HELD BACK

Mutinuous Seamen Refuse to
Operate Carriers.

HAMBURG UNION PROTESTS

Action of Rebellious Sailors Is Held
to Represent Merely a Small
Communist Section.

BERLIN, March 21.—(Via Copenhagen.)—The German steamers Burgermeister Von Melle and Burgermeister Schroeder, which were scheduled to sail on March 18, in accordance with the agreement reached at Brussels between German and inter-allied food commissions have been prevented from leaving Hamburg, owing to a resolution adopted by seamen there refusing to operate ships demanded by entente nations.

Some newspapers protest against the resolution and say it represents the will of a "small communist section," and that it is strongly disavowed by other seamen's associations. The Hamburg transport workers' union has lodged a protest against the action of the seamen.

HAMBURG, March 21.—At a mass meeting of seamen held on Tuesday the following resolution was adopted:

"Today's mass meeting of seamen of all descriptions refuses to participate in the delivery of German merchant ships demanded by the entente, and declares it to be the duty of all seamen and laborers to refuse to work on these ships."

The resolution was adopted on the ground that there was no guarantee that Germany would receive any food except the initial delivery.

BASEL, March 21.—(Havas.)—Ten German submarines which are to be delivered to the entente powers have left Hamburg, according to a dispatch received here.

BASEL, March 21.—The president of the German armistice commission at Spa has presented a note to the inter-allied delegates asking if Germany should consider as true statements in the French and British press that the peace treaty would be ready for the Germans as soon as President Wilson approved, but that the Germans would be allowed neither to discuss nor modify the document, according to Berlin advices.

BERLIN, March 21.—The address of homage circulated on the occasion of the former emperor's birthday received 416,912 signatures, it was announced. The address and signatures will be bound in a series of 37 volumes and sent to Amerigo.

"Certainly not," replied the dentist. "A poor man or poor woman could not be expected to pay \$1000 for dental work. I would have done the work, but for a smaller fee."

ROBBERY INDICTMENT LOST
Bend Prosecutor to Dismiss Case
Against Elsie Bailey.

REND, Or., March 21.—(Special.)—Loss of the original indictment in the case of Mrs. Elsie Bailey, charged with robbery, and the fact that the defendant's 11-year-old son, chief witness for the state, has disappeared since he aided in convicting his mother at a previous term of court, will cause the case, remanded by the supreme court for rehearing, to be dismissed, District Attorney A. J. Moore announced today.

Cases to be tried in the circuit court here at the April term include those of Jabe Warner, charged with cattle rustling, and the \$10,000 suit brought by C. J. Stauffer against William Brown, wealthy stockman of Elsie, for alleged malicious prosecution.

ALLEGED SWINDLER TAKEN
Salesman Arrested in South May Be
Brought to Eugene.

EUGENE, Or., March 21.—(Special.)—John Von Eyth, a former commercial salesman who for years traveled through the Willamette valley and who is said to have passed a worthless draft for \$5 at the Hotel Osborn in this city several months ago, has been caught at Los Angeles, according to word received by Sheriff Fred G. Strickland today, but is being held there on a charge of grand larceny.

Chief of Police Butler of Los Angeles sends word that he will be held for the Eugene authorities if he is not convicted there. In that case he will be brought here for trial.

LIQUOR EVIDENCE TAXED
Montana Officers Told Government
Must Have \$3.20 a Gallon.

BUTTE, Mont., March 21.—Clinton H. Moore, collector of internal revenue for Butte, today notified the silver flow county commissioners that they must pay a federal tax of \$3.20 a gallon on quantities of confiscated liquor which is being held as court evidence in bootlegging cases.

UNDERTAKER ON DEFENSE

BURIAL OF SOLDIERS IN PLAIN

Seattle Firm Is Accused of Collecting
From Relatives of Men and
Also From Government.

SEATTLE, March 21.—Counsel for G. M. Butterworth, local undertaker implicated in a charge of defrauding the government and relatives of deceased sailors and marines of the 13th naval district, asserted in federal district court today, during his trial, that plain wooden boxes substituted and other changes made in the government contract were proper because the caskets had been passed by naval inspectors.

The government charges that Butterworth, manager of E. R. Butterworth & Sons, charged relatives for extra funeral expenses when materials were supplied by the government and also collected the government contract price in addition. Various undertakers, including Everett M. Smith from Brooklyn, Kan., were called as witnesses by the government.

One of several caskets exhibited to the jury had been exhumed in Montana.

BLOCKADE YET NECESSARY

British Told Unrestricted Trade Cannot
Be Allowed for Present.

LONDON, March 21.—(By the Canadian Press.)—In the house of commons today Mr. Brown Stoker suggested that in view of the almost total cessation of movements in the cotton trade and the consequent scarcity of wool, the free movement of goods to Scandinavia, Denmark and Holland should be permitted.

A. R. Harmsworth, under-secretary of state for foreign affairs, replied that the abrogation of the blockade arrangements could only be carried out with the consent of the allies. As soon as its purpose as one of the most important levers for obtaining the enemy's acceptance and execution of the allies' terms was accomplished, the government would welcome the possibility of removing the blockade restrictions.

kicking and screaming. The objectors set up a hunger strike, he said, and rattled their keys for hours at a time and could not be stopped.

"In the midst of this condition," Major Foster went on, "we took from a conscientious objector a circular sent out by Upton Sinclair, socialist leader, in which he reprinted a letter from Newton D. Baker to the president of the United States, advising the president in regard to a complaint Sinclair had made of mistreatment of socialists."

Letter Is Quoted.
"The letter said:
"I think, Sir, he should be informed that we are now doing all that public opinion will stand in the interest of conscientious objectors and others who have been treated in this manner with those of a vast majority of their fellow countrymen."

BAKER REFUSES TO LISTEN
Secretary Asserts He Is Not Interested in Accusations.

EL PASO, Tex., March 21.—"Don't read me any more of that—I have no interest in it," Secretary Newton D. Baker declared tonight at the close of his Liberty hall speech on the league of nations when shown the Associated Press report of Major Dick B. Foster's Kansas City address, in which he charged the war secretary of "intentionally or unintentionally aiding and assisting the I. W. W., international socialists and humanitarians in their programme of blocking construction of the army."

After listening patiently while the first 200 words of the dispatch were read, Secretary Baker stopped reading in the middle of a sentence, brushed aside the report and insisted that he had "no interest whatever" in the charges of the ex-army officer.

"I have nothing to say about it—absolutely nothing," he said as he walked away.

ing out its recent decision to take action for bringing about a cessation of hostilities between the Ukrainians and the Poles, the allied supreme council has sent a wireless message to General Paderewski of the Polish forces, and another to General Rosawadewsky of the Ukrainian army, enjoining both commanders to cause a suspension of hostilities by their forces on the Lemberg front immediately.

The council stipulates that the troops shall retain their positions as at present, but that the Lemberg front, but permit sufficient freedom of passage through the lines for the daily provisioning of Lemberg.

The council sets forth its willingness to make statements from both sides as to their territorial claims and allow each to be represented in Paris by such qualified persons as they may deem it advisable to choose, with a view to extending the truce into an armistice. The hearing accorded such representatives, however, will be entirely conditional upon the immediate cessation of fighting.

TACOMA, Wash., March 21.—Clark Scudemaker, who has just completed his second term as sheriff of Cowitza county, has been appointed appraiser for the state land office by Land Commissioner Clark W. ACTIVE FIGHTING ON IN NORTHERN RUSSIA

BATTLE FOUGHT AT NIGHT

Bolshevik Will Have Material Advantage
When the Rivers Open
and Become Navigable.

ARCHANGEL, March 20.—(By the Associated Press.)—Activity has considerably increased along the Vologda railway and on the Vilna front. On both sectors the bolsheviks have been defeated by the allied and American troops.

A small bolshevik raiding party, making its way over the snow, surprised an allied artillery position in the forest near the Vologda railway. After considerable fighting in the darkness the bolsheviks were killed, and others of the party were made prisoners.

Reds Will Have Advantage.
As the winter has been unusually mild in northern Russia, it is expected that within a month the thaws will come to make extensive land fighting impracticable. The bolsheviks will have a big advantage when the rivers open. The Dvina and Vaga rivers will be navigable near the fighting front before the Dvina opens up farther north near Archangel.

This condition would permit the bolshevik gunboats to reach the vicinity of Berezit before the allied fleet could steam southward to meet them. Efforts are being made, however, to speed up the arrival of the allied fleet in the fighting zone in order to confine the bolshevik advantage to the shortest time possible. In the meantime as long as the present cold weather continues it is a race against time to move over the snow before the thaw comes sufficient big guns and ammunition to hold the enemy boats in control until the allied vessels can move southward. In this work the allied transport service is performing a tremendous task in spite of the shortage of hay and oats which has weakened the horses for the long hauls over the snow and added greatly to the difficulties of the situation.

BERNE, March 21.—(Havas.)—The Ukrainian forces of General Petliura have successfully resumed the offensive according to advices to the Swiss Telegraph Agency from Proskuroff, the seat of the Petliura government. The position of the bolsheviks in the Ukraine is declared to be critical.

Ukrainians Take Towns.
Advancing northward, the Ukrainians are reported to have recaptured Sarny, an important railway junction southeast of Bratslav.

Along the railway running from Sarny to Vilna, the Ukrainians have occupied Dombrovitz and Tolna. They have also driven the bolsheviks from the line of the Gordyn river in the Pripiet marshes.

BAGGAGE MAN FOUND DEAD
Gunshot Wound Ends Life of Accused Railway Employee.

SPOKANE, Wash., March 21.—Grant McCully, a veteran employee of the W. R. & N. company here as a baggage clerk, was found dead of a gunshot wound in his home here today. McCully was at liberty on his personal bond charged with receiving stolen property.

The house was locked when police went in search of McCully today, and the officers broke in. It was not known how long McCully had been dead.

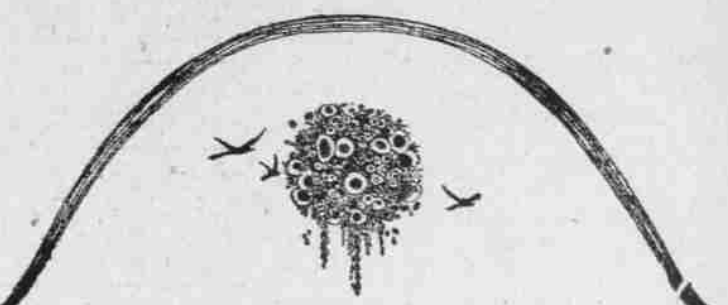
