

RUPERT BOUND FOR MEXICO

CONVICT BUYS OUTFIT FROM RAILROAD SECTION HAND.

East News From Posses Indicates Fleeing Man Boarded South-bound Train at Gazelle.

SALEM, Or., March 21.—(Special.)—With the aid of an unidentified confederate, Clyde J. (Red) Rupert, former Portland policeman and escaped convict from the state penitentiary, is making his way toward the Mexican border in an effort to evade a federal prison term which he faces immediately upon his release from the state prison.

Definite word of Rupert's actions since his escape from the state line plant near Gold Hill was received at the prison this morning by Warden Stevens. After making his break from the line plant, Rupert went to Gold Hill, where he purchased a black soft hat, a gray flannel shirt and a pair of overalls from a section hand. He was whisked south in an automobile driven by some confederate.

The next heard from him was at Gazelle, 199 miles south of Gold Hill, on Tuesday morning. At Gazelle he was positively identified. It was also learned that he boarded a southbound train at that point.

Rupert is believed to be plentifully supplied with funds, and prisoners at Gazelle feel certain that he is heading toward the Mexican border or South America.

Rupert was convicted in the federal and state courts at Portland last spring of the theft of \$19,000 in liberty bonds from the Northwestern National bank, where he had been employed as guard.
