INDICTMENT IS DISMISSED—Milton W. Smith, a Portland attorney who was indicted January 4, 1918, for the alleged appropriation of \$500 given him by a client to invest in a mortgage, was relieved of prosecution by the dismissal of the indictment by Presiding Judge Stapleton yesterday on the representation of the complaining witness, Bertha Jones, that restitution had been made. Larceny by bailee was the crime charged. The \$500 has been paid back and Deputy District Attorney Pierce offered no objection to the dismissal of the indictment.

New Chapel to Open—J. P. McEntee, formerly of the firm of Dunning & McEntee, undertakers, will open a new undertaking establishment at Sixteenth and Everett streets under the firm name of McEntee & Elliott. The new chapel and parlors will be open for public inspection tomorrow. A feature of the new establishment will be the arrangement by which the case of mourners are taken by an inside passage directly from the chapel to the garage, thus obviating the necessity of crossing the sidewalk to waiting machines.

LAURENCE HALL FUND GROWS—E. C. Richards, secretary of education for Willamette university, has secured another \$100 for the new Laurence hall, home for women, soon to be erected upon the campus. The gift comes from a friend who wishes her name withheld for the present. It entitled her to name a room in the building. The new Laurence will replace the present historic one which was a gift from Mrs. Chloe A. Willson, first teacher in the school. Mrs. Willson gave the ground upon which the school stands.

REGULATIONS IN MEASURE ARE REVOKED—Regulations of the department of the interior relating to the purchase, possession and use of explosives for all agricultural purposes are revoked, according to a ruling received by the county clerk yesterday. The regulations do not allow enemy aliens or subjects of a country allied with an enemy to manufacture, purchase, sell, use or possess explosives, and do not release any person who is in violation with the law regarding safeguarding the storing of explosives.

TIMEPIECES TO BE MOVED AHEAD AT 2 A. M.—Instructions with regard to moving forward timepieces and dispatchers and railroad employees were received yesterday by railroad administration officials and are being forwarded to those affected in the Portland district. As the lines centering here do not ramify into other districts the procedure will be extremely simple. It is ordered that at 2 A. M. Sunday, March 23, the timepieces be moved ahead one hour to show 2 A. M.

ELLIS H. JONES JR. ARRIVES—Among recent arrivals in town is Ellis H. Jones Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Ellis H. Jones of 521 East Twenty-third street. Weighing seven and a half pounds, the junior member of the family came into the world two days ago at St. Vincent's hospital, where the mother and baby are doing well. Mr. Jones is a member of The Oregonian news staff, while Mrs. Jones is an Oklahoma girl. The baby is the first grandson of Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Jones of Lash Meadows.

BOTS ARRESTED FOR THEFT—Wallace E. Denkel, 17, and Carl O. Axell, 18, were arrested yesterday by Chief Inspector Clark and Inspector Smith and charged with the theft of an automobile from Rev. Mrs. Leekley is said to have received from a man named Johnson five of these certificates several months ago to be registered. Mr. Johnson left no address and said he would call later. Accepting them was a violation of the regulations. Yesterday Johnson demanded his five stamps. Mrs. Leekley is said to have handed him out three and he raised a row. The woman, who has some liberty bonds, made restitution for the woman, but owing to the alleged violation of duty, the complaint had to be filed. Commissioner Drake placed her bail at \$1000.

MRS. KATHERINE REED PASSES—Mrs. Katherine Reed, 79, mother of Henry E. Reed, county assessor, died Thursday at her home, 559 Grand avenue north. Funeral services will be held at 9 A. M. today in St. Andrew's church, East Ninth and Albert streets. Interment will be in Mount Calvary cemetery. Mrs. Reed was born at Carrick on Suir, Ireland. She came to the United States 60 years ago, and lived successively in New York, San Francisco and Portland. She came to Oregon in 1872. Mrs. Reed is survived by three sons, Henry E., J. T. and Joseph L. Reed, and one daughter, Mrs. M. E. Gannon, all of Portland.

MOVEMENT ON FOOT TO ADOPT 100-TO-BLOCK PLAN.

Resolution by Commissioner Perkins to Be Submitted to City Council at Meeting Wednesday.

All Portland houses will be renumbered under a uniform plan of 100 numbers to each block if a resolution being prepared by City Commissioner Perkins is adopted by the city council next Wednesday. Under the present system there are 20 numbers in each block, although Commissioner Perkins states that in many blocks the plan has been upset, leaving less than 20 in some and more than 20 in others.

A change from the present numbering system in Portland has been urged in scores of communications received by city officials. One communication which was filed with the city council this week calls attention to the duplication of numbers on Willamette boulevard and in other parts of the city where the numbers are badly jumbled.

Commissioner Perkins will point out to the city council the difficulties encountered by strangers coming to Portland searching for street numbers.

MOTION TO ERASE DENIED

Court Rules Irrigation Suit May Be Heard Here.

The motion of Attorney Wallace McCannatt that the complaint of Twoby brothers against the Ochoco Irrigation district, Clark-Kendall company, and American Surety company, seeking payment for part of the work done on a big irrigation project, be stricken from the files on the grounds that Multnomah county is not the proper place for the adjudication and that the defendants should be sued separately, was denied by Circuit Judge Tucker yesterday. The jurist held that it was all one suit in equity for cancellation of contract, and one defendant has headquarters in Portland.
