Drying Up of Turkey Shows Seven Last Plagues Near, Says Bible

Judgments Foretold in Prophecies to Be Real, and Will Be Poured Upon Those Who Willfully Disobey God, Declares Evangelist Dickson.

The drying up of the Turkish empire, which God now abhors, has been going on for some time and is given as a sign of the near approach of the seven last plagues of Bible prophecy, which will be world-wide in extent, the falling of which will mark the end of mercy for the unbelieving and disobedient, were among the decarations of Evangelist L. K. Dickson.

"According to Rev. 16 the plagues are given as follows: 1.—A noxious and grievous sore" (Vs. 2) or ulcer. (The Greek word from which the word is derived means a sore which is almost literally into the Latin as ulcer.) It will be, then, a malignant and deadly ulcer deeply embedded, severe, and unrelenting and which will not relieve its victims by ending their pains with death; for while the fifth plague is falling, it is stated that men blasphemed God because of their sores. Perhaps it may be similar to the parallel plague which fell upon Egypt (Ex. 9:11).

"The sixth plague will turn to blood of a dead man. Vs. 2. 3. Vs. 4-7. This is the description of the terrible retribution for the blood of the saints shed by violent hands, which will be given to those who have done or wish to do, such deeds. The question as to who are the saints may be answered by reading Rev. 12 of Rev. 13, for here we find that the saints are commandment keepers who have been cleansed through faith because of their sores. 4.—Great heat from the sun (Vs. 8). The Greek conveys the idea of heat increased to fire. Such unusual heat extends its desolation all around. Beasts share with human beings the suffering caused by this burning heat (Joel 1:1-3, 16-20).

"The final drying up of Turkish empire, or that power which will be the symbol of the world, is mentioned at that time. This one plague may be said to be symbolic, as there is no literal explanation for it, because of the fact that the rivers of the earth will all be dried up before this time comes, through the work of the second, third, fourth and fifth plagues. Water stars for people, nations and tongues (Rev. 17:15). Therefore, this plague must be interpreted as we have just mentioned. For many years ago Turkey has been diminishing in territory and in every other way, and this very fact constitutes a great sign of the nearness of the seven last plagues, for she comes to be under the sixth plague, at the time of the great battle of Armageddon (Vs. 16), and the wonderworking of demons.
