HUSBAND'S TEMPER HELD DIVORCE CASE.—Catherine A. Murray asserts that her husband, Patrick Murray, would spit on the floor in their home, call her an "old cat," refuse to pay household bills in excess of \$15 a month and offer her "a free ride of 52 miles," meaning to the asylum at Salem, in a divorce complaint filed in the circuit court yesterday.

SEVENTY-FIVE COUNTIES OBTAIN QUOTAS.—Seventy-five of Oregon's counties have reported complete quotas in the drive for membership in the state chamber of commerce. An estimate places the fund now raised at \$35,000, or within \$15,000 of the objective, according to John L. Etheridge, state membership chairman.
