BRYANT PETITION IS NEI AVEN RY COUNCIL

C. A. Strickland Asks Permission to Use Auditorium.

LABOR VIEWS ARE GIVEN

City Officials to Make Thorough Investigation Into Character of Proposed Address.

Action on the picition of C. A. Strickland for the use of the public auditorium on April 2 for an address by Louise Bryant, wife of John Reed, former Portland writer, who is alleged to be actively connected with the bol-shevik regime in Russia, was deferred yesterday by the city council until re-ports can be secured from cities in which she has already spoken. It is probable that the council will take definite action on the petition temor-

City Commissioner Bigelow said that the city officials deemed it advisable to make a thorough investigation into the character of the address to be made by Miss Bryant, as under the criminal syndicalism act, passed by the legisla-ture, city officials are held responsible for the expressions of any person ap-pearing in the public auditorium.

Labor Views Are Given. Harry Anderson, president of the central labor council, told the city commissioners that the body which he commissioners that the body which he represented was not sponsoring Miss Bryant and had no connection whatsoever with her proposed appearance in Portland. As an individual opinion. Mr. Anderson said that it was some-

Mr. Anderson said that it was some-times better to grant petitions of this left to avoid a certain reaction if brought about through barring certain speakers in the auditorium.

"The central labor council is firm for free speech, and it is also the opinion of the council that the city has sufficient police power to control meetings in the auditorium," he says.
"From what I have learned, Miss Bryant is not appearing as an advo-

"From what I have learned, Miss Bryant is not appearing as an advocate for any organization such as the bolshevists, but is relating what she saw during six months' solourn in Russia as a war correspondent."

C. A. Strickland, who presented the petition to the council, said that Miss Bryant was a Portland girl, who had been employed by 18 leading newspapers to go to Russia as a correspondent and that she was not being sponsored by any revolutionary openizations, either national, international or local.

Socialists Ask Concession. The demand made by the socialist babor party for permission to use Alisky hall for its meetings was filed by the council after reports from po-lice officers showed that the city offleials had taken no stops to deny the organization the right to hold meet

Police officers had warned the own ers of the Alisky building, which the socialists desire to use, of the provi-sions of the criminal syndicalism act, which holds the building owners re-sponsible for the actions and remarks aponsible for the actions and remarks of the persons renting the building.

The petition filed by the socialist or-ganization stated that no laws had been violated by their members or or-ganization, that they were carrying on an educational propaganda for "indus-trial unionism." which, they predicted, would be a form of government in time to replace the present govern-


