

## REDRESS GRIEVANCES. IS SUFFRAGIST PLEA

Course Declared Necessary to  
Avert Revolution.

### CONVENTION FOR LEAGUE

Submission of Amendment for Na-  
tion-Wide Suffrage and Number  
of Other Reforms Asked.

ST. LOUIS, March 28.—The National American Woman Suffrage association today adopted resolutions endorsing the league of nations and urging the United States government to "bring about prompt redress of all legitimate grievances" as a safeguard against revolution.

With the adoption of a long list of resolutions the convention proper practically closed its sessions, the formal adjournment being taken tomorrow noon after a morning session of the league of women voters, composed of delegates from presidential suffrage states. The selection of the next convention site probably will be left to the board of directors.

Heading the list of resolutions was one calling upon the 56th congress to submit the constitutional amendment for nation-wide woman suffrage to the states at the earliest possible moment. Others included:

**Professional Status Sought.**  
Recommendation that in the future the government recognize the fitness of accepting the services of professional women for work for which their training and experience have qualified them, it being said that women physicians and dentists were compelled to serve in the war under the French flag because their services were declined by the United States government.

That congress establish a permanent women's bureau in the United States department of labor, with adequate funds to continue the work.

That government residence halls for women be placed in the hands of women.

That congress give military rank to army nurses.

**New Department Urged.**  
Urging the establishment at Washington of a national department of education, with a secretary of education in the cabinet.

The full resolution referring to bolshevism, without mentioning it, reads: "Whereas, Revolution is rife in Europe and may spread to this country; and whereas, we desire that all needed improvements in the United States shall be made by peaceful means instead of by violence and bloodshed, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we urge our government to bring about prompt redress of all legitimate grievances as the removal of the sense of injustice is the surest safeguard against revolution by violence."

**Women Celebrate Victory.**  
The mass meeting at the Odette tonight developed into a celebration in honor of the passage of the suffrage bill by the Missouri senate. As at the afternoon session, the meeting was transformed into a bedlam of shouting, applauding suffragists when the news was announced.

Order was restored by Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, when she urged the women to sing the "Doxology." The 2,000 persons in the hall sang it.

Banners bearing the inscription "I am a voter" were distributed among the Missouri members.

Miss Helen Fraser of England and Governor Henry Allen of Kansas were the speakers.

Miss Fraser made a plea for financial assistance for Europe and declared the only remedy for bolshevism is constructive reform, the building of a better society and the greater spread of justice.

She declared Germany shows no signs of contrition or repentance and that the indemnity asked of her can be paid by that country in five years.

### MISSOURI SUFFRAGISTS SCORE

Action in Legislature Ends Women's  
Fight in State.

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., March 28.—The Missouri senate today granting women the right to vote for presidential electors and immediately afterward adopted a resolution submitting to the voters a constitutional amendment for woman suffrage in all elections. The senate's action is considered as ending the women's fight, as the house is overwhelmingly for suffrage.

### McNARY TO ASK CUT-OFF

RAILROAD ADMINISTRATION'S  
ASSISTANCE DESIRED.

Oregon Senator Will Explain Im-  
portance of Improvement on  
Klamath County Road.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-  
ington, March 28.—An appeal will be made to the railroad administration by Senator McNary tomorrow to complete the Natron cutoff of the Southern Pacific railroad, which would mean the construction of approximately 20 miles of road, from Oak Ridge in Lane county, Or., to Kirk, Klamath county. This would shorten the route by rail to San Francisco and put Klamath Falls on the main line railroad. The matter will be presented to T. C. Powell, director of the division of capital expenditures, who has power under certain conditions to set aside money to build extensions from the fund which congress is expected to provide for that purpose very soon after it meets in the extra session.

The last congress was asked to appropriate \$750,000,000 for improvements and extensions, but the measure was killed in the last-minute senate filibuster. It has been the position of the railroad administration that under extraordinary circumstances capital should be supplied for needed extensions where the railroad systems affected will approve the proposed new construction. It is believed that if the communities concerned will organize and secure through their commercial organization the approval of this line, the money will be forthcoming.

## EMPEROR WILLIAM AND FORMER CROWN PRINCE FREDERICK WILLIAM WILL BE AMONG THOSE WHO WILL BE TRIED BY THE HIGH COURT WHICH THE GERMAN NATIONAL AS- SEMBLY WILL CREATE, PARIS NEWSPAPERS SAY.

BERLIN, March 27.—(By the Associated Press).—That the new Prussian government is vigorously attacking the problem of ousting the members of the imperial regime from important posts in the administration was illustrated today by appointment of Herr Phillips of Breslau as first president of Silesia and Herr Poller of Kiel as head of the administration of Schleswig-Holstein. Both men are majority socialists.

WEIMAR, via Copenhagen, Thursday, March 27.—Replying in the national assembly today to a question regarding the message sent to Budapest by M. Tchitcherin, foreign minister of the Russian soviet government, describing the complexity of the Russian soviet army, Gustave Noske, minister of defense, said the Russian statement was untrue so far as it referred to the German troops.

The Letts and the Lithuanians were mainly involved in the fighting in the Baltic countries, Herr Noske declared, and the Germans had only occupied the railway line to safeguard the bringing up of supplies. The German authorities, he stated, had agreed that no offensive should be undertaken in Courland or the Ukraine by German forces.

"It is certain that the safeguarding of the German frontier will unfortunately still be necessary," the minister of defense added, "but the government only entertains a lively wish to live in peace and good neighborliness with Russia."

In his wireless message to Budapest M. Tchitcherin was quoted in press dispatches as asserting that Field Marshal von Hindenburg was carrying out an advance on Kovno, which lies directly east of East Prussia and immediately to the south of the Baltic province of Courland.

## GALE PREVENTS TRIP BY MR. McNARY

Appeal for Ships to Move  
Wheat Is Delayed.

### FESTIVAL U-BOATS LACKING

Representative McArthur Informed  
No Ships or Submarines Avail-  
able for Rose Show.

ington, March 28.—A 55-mile an hour gale prevented Senator McNary from taking an airplane flight to New York today to see Julius Barnes, director of the grain corporation, regarding the release of ships for moving wheat and wheat products from the Portland harbor. The trip had to be deferred for two or three days, and meanwhile Senator McNary is getting together data for his speech on the railroad administration for the construction of the Natron cutoff. The fact that this piece of construction would form the connecting link for an important main line is regarded as a most potent argument for the building of the road.

No battleships, cruisers or submarines are available for the Rose Festival at Portland in June, according to a communication forwarded today by Assistant Secretary of the Navy Roosevelt, to Representative McArthur. The only ships of the navy operating on the Pacific, the latter says, are the Minnapanolis, Oregon, Vicksburg, Marblehead and Yorktown, and the territory over which they must cruise is held too large to permit their being detailed to the festival.

Of the two submarine fleets, one is old and unable to venture far from its base at San Pedro, Cal. The other, of newer type submarines, will not be in easy distance of Portland at the time of the festival.

The city of Portland may have the expert services of John Diller, a noted government geologist, to examine Bull Run lake as to its feasibility for storing the city's water supply, provided the municipality will pay his travel expenses to the Pacific coast and back again, together with incidental expenses, according to a letter sent today to Representative McArthur by the geological survey. The letter suggests, however, that equally satisfactory results might be had by consulting with the representative of the United States bureau of mines at Corvallis, Or.

Elmore, president of the farmers' union of Washington state, saying that a recent trip through Oregon and Washington convinced him that 75 per cent of the farmers in those two states are for a league of nations.

More OREGON HEROES DUE  
Charge of Discrimination in Moving  
Troops Is Denied.

ington, March 28.—(Special).—The war department denied yesterday that there is discrimination against companies B and D, 16th ammunition train, in the returning of troops from overseas. The companies include many Oregon soldiers and complaints from Hood River said that they were being overlooked in listing the organizations for redeployment.

Representative Sinnott was advised that these troops have been assigned to early convoy and probably will sail within the month. A Camp Lewis detachment of the 35th Infantry, five officers and 80 men, is due to arrive in New York, April 4, on the Kentuckian. Another Camp Lewis detachment of the same regiment, 12 officers and 62 men, is due at New York on the transport Siboney, April 2. A Camp Lewis detachment of the 34th Infantry, 12 officers and 125 men, is also on the Siboney.

All these troops are of the 1st division. A detachment of the 14th Infantry, one officer and 29 men, and a detachment of 14th Infantry, both of the 27th division and bound for Camp Lewis, are due at Newport News, Virginia, on April 3.

SALESMEN PLEAD GUILTY  
H. W. Quinn and W. J. Picard Fined  
for Violation of Blue Sky Law.

H. W. Quinn and W. J. Picard, mining stock salesmen, pleaded guilty to a violation of the blue sky law before Presiding Judge Stapleton of the circuit court yesterday. Quinn was fined \$200, and Picard, who was acting as Quinn's agent, was fined \$50.

Both men were arrested at the instance of Corporation Commissioner Schulerman on March 21 on the charge of selling stock in Oregon without first submitting their proposals to him and securing a permit. They had disposed of stock in the Hercules copper mine to G. H. Temple, according to the violation cited.

The promoters were bound over to the grand jury by District Judge Bell March 22. Indictments were returned against both yesterday. The pleas of guilty were entered on recommendation made by Deputy District Attorney Hamersley, and fines levied in less than five minutes, the matter coming before the judge as he was in the midst of default divorce cases.

WEISGERBER TRIAL ENDED  
Result of Court-Martial for Alleged  
Disloyalty Not Yet Announced.

NEW YORK, March 28.—The trial of Captain Edwin C. Weisgerber of Pittsburgh, charged with disloyalty to the United States, sympathy with Germany and improper personal conduct, was completed before a court-martial on Governor's Island today. The findings of the court be submitted to the headquarters of the eastern department for approval, the case submitted to Washington and subsequently published, so that it may be two or three weeks before the verdict is announced.
