

LOWDEN LOOMING LARGE ON HORIZON

Senator Harding of Ohio, Also
May Be Candidate.

WEEKS LOOKS TO CABINET

Hoosier Would Run If Sufficiently
Urged—Hays May Get Governor-
ship Nomination.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Wash-
ington, March 31.—Within a year from
now the first of the presidential pre-
ference primaries will be held, looking
to selection of delegates for the Re-
publican and Democratic national con-
ventions of 1920.

This fact is not being overlooked by
friends of prospective candidates. If
current gossip of the capital can be
relied upon two or three bureaus are
already at work to boom candidates.
Governor Lowden of Illinois is a can-
didate for the Republican nomination
and has an organization in Chicago.
Senator Harding of Ohio, who divides
with Governor Lowden the support of
the conservative element in the Re-
publican party, undoubtedly will be a
candidate and it has been suggested in
the east that former Senator Weeks
of the leading conservatives, him-
self a candidate in 1916, who polled
more votes on one ballot than any
other candidate before the convention
except Hughes, the nominee, will man-
age the Harding campaign for the
nomination.

Weeks will play an active part in
the pre-convention plans of the Re-
publican party and is generally credited
here with an ambition to be either
secretary of the treasury or secretary
of the navy in the next cabinet. If
the administration is republican. There
appears to be no doubt that he will
manage the campaign of either Gov-
ernor Lowden or Senator Harding and
it is accepted here as certain that both
will be candidates. Some significance
is attached to the fact that Mr. Weeks,
Senator Harding and Senator Cummins
with other republican statesmen, in-
cluding the new prospective speaker of
the house of representatives, Frederick
M. Gillett, have been together at
southern resorts since the adjournment
of congress.

Hoosiers May Get Votes.

Governor Goodrich and Senator Wat-
son of Indiana have been mentioned as
likely to receive the vote of Indiana on
the first ballot. It is certain that both
will not be candidates. Senator Watson
has been assured of re-nomination to
the Senate without opposition. If he
permits his name to be presented by
his state for the presidential nomi-
nation, he will have to forego the re-
nomination for the Senate.

Upon Senator Watson's decision will
depend, in a measure, the political
future of Governor Goodrich. If Wat-
son enters the race for president, Gov-
ernor Goodrich will seek the senator-
ship. Otherwise he will be a candidate
for president with the hope, on the
part of his friends that he will be
nominated for vice-president.

It is conceded in Indiana that Will H.
Hays, chairman of the republican na-
tional committee, will be nominated
for governor by the Indiana Republi-
cans. He may be named by acclama-
tion.

Much Sentiment Out for Wood.

Three distinct groups within the re-
publican party are expected to furnish
the material from which the next
presidential candidate will be drawn.
Conservatives, progressives and mili-
tary heroes. It is admitted by the
progressives that the chances are that
the first named will be the candidate.
Of military heroes there appears to be
no available name at present except
that of General Leonard Wood. There
is really much sentiment for Wood.
The best information obtainable as
to General Pershing is that he will not
be a candidate under any circum-
stances. That is the impression of his
friends in Washington; it is also the
opinion of his father-in-law, Senator
Warren. Ex-Senator Dick of Ohio is
busy with an organization, which he
had the forethought to incorporate,
booming General Pershing, regardless
of how the general may feel.

Hitchcock Causes Concern.

Politicians here have been concerned
the past week over a report from
abroad that Frank H. Hitchcock, the
well-known politician, who was iden-
tified with the pre-convention cam-
paign of Charles H. Hughes in 1916,
was conferring with General Pershing
and had been actually photographed
standing alongside General Pershing.
That looked ominous to the old guard
here, who do not like Hitchcock over-
much. The aggressive young Hitchcock
has been deeply submerged in business
since the Hughes fiasco. After he had
nominated Hughes, or rather directed
the work in the pre-convention cam-
paign, the old guard were sufficiently
powerful with Hughes to prevent
Hitchcock being made chairman of the
national committee to manage the
Hughes campaign and Mr. Wilcox was
chosen. Since the last election Hitch-

POSITION IS ACCEPTED WITH
LUMBERMEN'S TRUST CO.

Former Traffic Engineer for Port-
land Railway, Light & Power
Co. Completes War Work.

Harry C. Kendall, formerly traffic
engineer for the Portland Railway,
Light & Power company, has returned
to Portland to become associated with
the Lumbermen's Trust company.

As traffic engineer for the street
car company, Mr. Kendall had to do
with the re-routing of car lines in 1913
and 1914. From here he went to Denver
with F. W. Hild upon the latter's as-
suming management of the Denver
traction properties. For the past year
he has been connected with the Emer-
gency Fleet corporation in the negotia-
tions with public utility companies for
improved facilities and with the Dela-
ware river district as engineer.
Mr. Kendall is a graduate of the
Massachusetts Institute of Technology
and was at one time with the Westing-
house Electric company as commercial
engineer and later an instructor in
electric railway engineering at the
University of Illinois.

Portland Pupils.

Organization of boys' and girls' clubs
in Portland schools is being effected
this week through the efforts of T. D.
Kirkpatrick, who has taken charge of
the work under the joint direction of
the Oregon Agricultural college and
the city school system.

Mr. Kirkpatrick will be in charge of
the school gardens, of the individual
gardens of the pupils and of the clubs
which are interested in poultry and
canning. He has written to principals
of all Portland schools asking their co-
operation in the furthering of the club
movement. Parent-teacher associations
also have been requested to work with
Mr. Kirkpatrick in his organization ef-
fort.

GOVERNMENT DROPS CASE

HORACE MANN, OF IDAHO, NOT
TO BE PROSECUTED.

Non-Partisan League Solicitor
Charged by Gooding County
Council With Disloyal Remarks.

BOISE, Idaho, March 31.—(Special.)—
The Horace Mann case, which at-
tracted so much attention during the
last political campaign in this state,
has been dropped by the government.

Advices to the United States district
attorney's office from the department
of justice announce. This is the case
in which Mann was cited before and
condemned by the county council of
defense of Gooding county for alleged
treasonable remarks. He was a solli-

itor and worker for the Non-Partisan
League.

In its communication to United
States District Attorney McClear the
department of justice says: "Relating
to the espionage act case against Hor-
ace Mann, the department is firmly of
the opinion the facts submitted do not
warrant any further prosecution of
Mann. The answers to the county
council of defense were drawn out of
him and do not show willful action on
his part or intent to influence the
hearer against war service, nor do the
answers indicate clearly the basis of
a prosecution for acts referred to in
the answers. The case does not merit
further action by you." Mann is under
bond, but the case against him prob-
ably will be dismissed.
