

ARIZONA MAN HELD ON WIFE'S CHARGES

Release of Habeas Corpus Is
of Short Duration.

WRIT UPHELD BY COURT

Attorney for H. W. Crawford Scores
Police Custom of Holding Man
"for Investigation."

Presiding Judge Stapleton upheld the legality of a writ of habeas corpus on Sunday yesterday, when he denied the petition of the district attorney to quash the proceedings by which W. H. Crawford, wanted in Arizona for non-support, secured temporary freedom. The writ was brief, for Crawford was rearrested by Inspector Pat Maloney as he left the courtroom on a warrant issued by Municipal Judge Roseman.

Crawford is a public accountant, employed in the office of J. C. Richardson. He was following the same line of work in Arizona and he maintains his arrest is a political maneuver, due to his activities in a recent fight for a governorship. On the request of the sheriff of Maricopa county, Arizona, the arrest of Crawford was ordered by the chief of police Sunday. He was taken into custody by Inspectors La Salle and Swennes and held "for investigation" without bail.

Attorney T. Ryan, who notified and immediately began a fight to get his client out of jail, and at 10 o'clock Sunday night secured the signature of Circuit Judge Morley on a writ of habeas corpus. While the motion to quash this was being fought out before Judge Stapleton at noon yesterday, a telegraphic complaint was received from Arizona and a fugitive warrant was served as Crawford walked out of the courtroom. The charges were brought by Mrs. Beatrice Crawford, his wife.

The police custom of throwing a man into jail "for investigation" and refusing him bail was scored before the court by Attorney Ryan.

"What's the constitution to a police officer?" he asked. "If this sort of a thing is to continue, we might as well tear up the constitution." He declared he had never countenanced the practice when he was deputy district attorney, though District Attorney Evans said: "You know it's a common custom, and I dare say you've done it quite a few times yourself, Tom."

Deputy District Attorney Morley argued against sustaining the writ on the grounds that it was illegally issued by irregular methods. He held that the law made a writ of habeas corpus a civil proceeding and that it could not be exercised on a non-judicial day such as Sunday.

Judge Stapleton denied the motion to quash on the grounds that a writ of habeas corpus is an extraordinary legal measure designed for the protection of the public and could be invoked on Sunday.

NON-SUPPORT CHARGE MADE

Felony Warrant for Accountant Issued Last November.

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 31.—Deputy Sheriff E. A. Smith will leave tomorrow for Portland, Ore., to bring back W. H. Crawford, arrested there on a felony warrant charging non-support of his wife, according to an announcement tonight at Sheriff John Montgomery's office. The warrant was issued last November.

Crawford formerly was a public accountant here, but nothing is known, say sheriff's officers, of his political enemies, who he is said to have blamed for his arrest.

BUSINESS IN CITY GAINS

Bank Clearings and Building Permits Substantially Increased.

Bank clearings in Portland for the first three months of 1919, ending yesterday, were \$337,973,477, compared to \$241,945,930, for the same period last year. This is a gain of about 40 per cent. For March bank clearings were \$119,954,132, as against \$88,961,452 for the same month in 1918.

Building permits for March were \$775,405, to \$441,205 in March of 1918. The gain for the quarter in permits over last year was \$455,470, approximately 50 per cent.

Figures on postal receipts are no longer available, this information now being refused the public by order of Postmaster-General Burleson.

Essen Workers to Strike.

COPENHAGEN, March 31.—A conference of workers' delegates at Essen has adopted a resolution calling a general strike tomorrow. A Swedish dispatch to the Berlin Lokal Anzeiger reports the outbreak of a general strike there.

Five-Cent Theater Passes.

THE five-cent motion picture theater is gone. The partnership of film

infancy—nickel and the movies—has been dissolved. Officially it departed

this life in Portland last night, when Fred Langerman obliterated all five-cent signs at his New Grand theater; practically Portland saw the last of the

five-cent "movie" theater as an institution many months ago.

Increase in the cost of film, as well as in everything that goes into the exhibition of photoplays, is responsible for the elimination of the five-cent theater from amusement life. In November, 1917, when the war tax on admissions went into effect, the five-cent house was miraculously saved—exempt from the tax. But the tax which goes into effect today means a cent tax on that nickel admission—and even the New Grand yields to the inevitable.

Circle, New Grand, Princess, Burnside, Novelty, Rex—these are a few of the five-cent houses of not so long ago. But soon came a ten-cent charge for Saturdays and Sundays. Then 10 cents for all shows except matinees, and finally a ten-cent fee on all occasions, permitting the renting of better pictures, more attention to music, etc.

Screen Gossip.

PORTLAND RENO'S RIVAL

DIVORCE COURT RECORDS

BEAT ALL PREVIOUS MARKS.

Total of 401 Suits Filed First Three Months This Year as Against Only 241 Last Year.

In what appears to be an effort to push Reno off the map, Portland divorce courts broke all previous records in the three months ending yesterday.

During January, February and March, 1919, court records compiled by Deputy County Clerk Archie Buchtel show that 401 divorce suits were filed, compared with a total of 241 for the corresponding period of 1918. This is an increase of 66 for the three months, a fraction more than 52 divorces a month above the 1918 record.

Effort to hold his own, Cupid led more couples to the marriage license window of the courthouse during the past three months than last year, but only 84 more, about half the increase shown in the divorce records.

In 1918 for the first quarter there were 445 marriages, making 291 more marriages than divorces. During the last quarter the marriages were 526, only 125 more than the number of separations.

Yesterday showed one marriage license issued, four divorce complaints filed. An extremely small percentage of the divorce seekers fail to get decrees, and an extremely large portion receive their decrees through default, that is, the failure of the person sued to contest the case.

GIRL'S ARRAIGNMENT SET

Ruth Garrison Expected to Enter Plea of Not Guilty.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 31.—Ruth Garrison, 18, confessed prisoner of Mrs. Grace E. Storrs, her rival for the affections of Douglas M. Storrs, will be arraigned tomorrow in superior court on a charge of first degree murder. It is generally accepted that a plea of "not guilty" will be entered on the ground of mental irresponsibility.

Today Prosecuting Attorney W. C. Gresham of Okanogan county was unable, in an interview with Miss Garrison, to learn whether or not she would testify at the trial of Storrs in Okanogan, who is charged with a felony and gross misdemeanor as a result of his alleged relations with the girl.

Miss Garrison is still held in the county detention home.

RUSSIAN STOCKS TO MOVE

Railroad Supplies Soon Will Be on Way Westward.

SEATTLE, Wash., March 31.—Tons of railroad rolling stock and supplies gathered at Douglas M. Storrs, will be imperial Russian government for shipment to Siberia are soon to resume their journey westward, which was halted by the Russian revolution, according to a recent announcement.

Today the Japanese steamer Tokoku Maru was moved to a dock near the Meadows, an old race course, where the railroad stock is stored, to begin loading for Vladivostok. Three other vessels have been assigned by the shipping board to take on cargoes from the yard in the near future.

Three Killed in Seaplane Crash.

PENSACOLA, Fla., March 13.—Ensigns Carl Wigdel and L. A. Robbins and Student Officer E. L. D. Trux were killed and Ensign Jesse Simpson was injured in the collision of two seaplanes today at the naval air station here. The addresses of the men were not announced.

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EXTENSIONS MUST WAIT

RAILROAD ADMINISTRATION NOTIFIES SENATOR McNARY.

Oregon Timber Men Interested Deeply Over Question of Purchase of Railway Ties.

It is not the intention of the railroad administration to make any extension of lines for the present, was the information contained in a telegram received yesterday at the Chamber of Commerce from Senator McNary. The senator advised that he had been informed by the director-general of railroads that \$110,000,000 had been borrowed for operation purposes, and other securities allowed to be used for a basis of credit. Only such ties and material will be purchased as may be necessary for the safe operation of the lines. Railroads will be permitted to make extensions and betterments subject to the approval of the director-general if

sale is found for bonds to finance such operations.

Oregon timbermen and lumber manufacturers are much interested especially in the clause in Senator McNary's telegram relating to the purchase of ties. It is estimated by the forest service that Oregon and Washington mills cut 327,000,000 feet, board measure, during 1918, into railroad ties. This is estimated by railroad men as representing probably 12 per cent of the total number of ties normally required in the United States annually. But it is said that during the past 18 months the normal number of replacements have not been made, and the actual need of the railroads is therefore much greater than usual. But how long the replacement can be deferred is a matter of doubt.

The Chamber of Commerce is exerting every effort to aid the producers to find a market that will keep the mills in operation and provide employment for loggers and lumbermen. Further developments are anticipated by the lumbermen through the efforts of their representative, who goes to Washington soon.

Big Tanker Still In Mud.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 31.—Three tugs tried today to pull the 10,300-ton

tanker Imlay off the Oakland mud

flats, where she grounded when launched at midnight.

Two tugs with a hawser between them to stop the ship in the deep water when she left the ways of the Moore shipyards were unable to hold her.
