

\$40,000 SUBSCRIBED IN LIVESTOCK DRIVE

Nearly 400 Workers Canvass
Business District.

OREGON FUTURE IS TOLD

Sale of Carlton Shorthorn for High-
est Price Ever Paid on Coast
Adds Impetus to Drive.

With approximately \$10,000 subscribed at noon yesterday, District Manager Henry E. Reed last night reported the Pacific International livestock exposition drive well under way and gathering momentum every hour. The number of canvassers recruited from the city's six big business clubs has now been increased to nearly 400, and a spirit of keen rivalry is developing among the teams of the various clubs.

"Our boys are all working hard," said Mr. Reed, "and they are getting results. They are making their great enthusiasm for this big developmental project all the more business and professional men of the city, and they are having very little trouble in signing up their prospects. The citizen of foresight and business intelligence is quick to recognize this enterprise as the biggest and best thing for the future of Portland and the northwest that has ever been organized."

Large Subscriptions Reported.
The largest subscription reported yesterday was that of The Oregonian, of \$2500. The Mitchell, Lewis & Staver company subscribed \$500, Archer & Higgins \$250, and the American Tire & Rubber company \$100.

Detailed reports have not been made, nor subscriptions checked up as yet at headquarters, which was a scene of great activity at 6 o'clock last night, with campaign hustlers and their captains and colonels pouring in from their day's work for the general nightly roundup.

General Manager O. M. Plummer yesterday announced the personnel of the newly-appointed building committee, which will have charge of the construction of the big pavilion, unit sections and other features of the permanent building plan for the 15-acre exposition center to cost upward of \$150,000.

Committee Is Named.
The committee members are Frank Robertson, prominent Oregon stockman and Portland bond dealer, chairman; J. C. Almsworth, president of the United States National bank; Fred S. Stinson, owner of the famous Hollywood farm near Seattle and one of the best-known breeders of Holsteins on the Pacific coast; C. C. Berkeley of the Baldwin Sheep & Land company of Hay Creek, Ore.; Leslie Butler of the Butler Bank company of Hills River; Natt McDonald, of A. Guthrie & Co., and Frank Brown, president of the Pacific International Livestock exposition.

As an instance of the growing importance of Oregon and the northwest in the livestock world, General Manager O. M. Plummer last night announced to drive workers the sale on Tuesday by President Frank Brown of the highest-priced female Shorthorn ever sold on the Pacific coast.

Heifer Brings High Price.
The sale was made at Mr. Brown's Carlton stock farm and the animal was the 2-year-old heifer "Bonnie Jean," bought by W. S. Cordner of Walla Walla.

J. B. Van Houten, a prominent sheepman of Las Vegas, N. M., walked into headquarters yesterday morning and handed Miss Florene Michaels, assistant secretary, \$25, with the statement that he wanted to be a stockholder, and added:

Chemists Active in War

A. S. Wells gives address at military academy.

Speaker Tells How Steel and All Other Materials Used in Vessels Underwent Tests.

"Chemists played an important part in the great war," said A. S. Wells, state chemist, in an address yesterday at Hill Military academy.

Mr. Wells outlined some of the work done by the chemists in testing steel and other materials used in ships, guns, tanks, airplanes, in analyzing foods and cloth used by the army and navy, and the manufacture of gases and explosives. Mr. Wells told of the work done in the state chemist's laboratory, testing the foods of the quartermaster's department of the United States army and analyzing food purchased by the French government from Oregon dealers.

A large percentage of these foods consisted of dehydrated vegetables and soups. Samples of these foods were distributed.

To add interest to his talk, Mr. Wells demonstrated a milk and butter test and showed some of the appliances used in making food analysis. The lecture was one of a series of Wednesday morning assemblies open to the public.

Diver to Seek Vessels

Hero of Eastland Disaster Will Look for Victims of Subs.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 2.—Hero of the Eastland disaster in Chicago July 24, 1915, Arthur Loeb, who rescued 38 persons from drowning in the Chicago river and brought up 67 bodies, is in Seattle on his way to New York.

Loeb said that following an operation for removal of a broken blood vessel in his head, suffered while diving in the hull of the submerged Eastland, he expects to engage in diving for steamers sunk by submarines off Brest, France, and the coast of Ireland. Loeb believes that many sunken vessels off the coast lie in not more than 100 feet of water and can be recovered.

FISHERMEN ASK ADVANCE

INCREASE IN PRICE OF SALMON
IS DEMANDED.

Higher Cost of All Equipment and
Materials, as Well as of Provi-
sions Given as Reason.

ASTORIA, Or., April 2.—(Special).—An increase in prices for raw salmon in the Columbia river district during the season which opens on May 1 is asked by the fishermen. The Columbia River Fishermen's Protective Union has set the price for chinooks at 12½ cents per pound, an advance of 1½ cents over last season, when the price was 11¼ cents.

The rate for bluebacks, white sturgeons and steelheads was set at 10 cents a pound, an increase of three-quarters of a cent above last year, while the price for greynings and green sturgeons was fixed at 7 cents a pound.

The fishermen claim that these prices are warranted by the fact that the cost of all equipment and materials, as well as of provisions, is higher. For example, they aver, twice is 20 cents a pound higher than last year, and is of so much poorer quality that a net will not last one season, whereas in former years it was good for two seasons, at least. Oil is advancing in price and the general living costs are higher.

Announcement is made here that the prices to be paid for raw salmon in the Bering sea, Alaska, district during the coming season have been adjusted by the packers and fishermen upon the same basis as last year. Under this agreement red salmon will bring 7 cents each at Nushagak river and 6½ cents at the other streams. The men will receive \$150 in place of \$130 that was paid last year and will work in the north before the season opens and after it closes will be on the basis of an eight-hour day.

CHINESE AMBITION DENIED

MORAL SUPPORT IS PROMISED
TO COREA.

Dr. Wang, on Way to Paris, Says
Disturbances in China Due to
Japanese Agitation.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 2.—"Corea is certain to adopt a republican form of government in the event that she monarchist, Dr. Ping Wen Kuo, president of Japan," said the Hon. Wang Ching Wai, who arrived here today from China. Dr. Wang is on his way to the Paris peace conference to act in the capacity of adviser to the Chinese delegates.

"In her effort to secure her independence, she has the entire moral support of China, all that we are able to extend to her," said Mr. Wang. "China has no ambitions in the matter of Corea."

In the party were General Tsing Tso Ping, who was active in the revolution which overthrew the Chinese monarchy; Dr. Ping Wen Kuo, president of the National Higher Normal college at Nanking, and Dr. L. K. Tao, professor in the Chinese government university at Peking. They will be followed later by 20 of the most prominent educators in China.

As spokesman for the party, Mr. Wang said that all monarchist ideas in China are dead. "The republic is an established thing," he said, "and there is no chance of any reversion to the old order. Such disturbances as are current in China at the present time are largely the result of Japanese agitation."

Two members of the Japanese parliament also arrived here today. They were T. Mochizuki and Y. Ozaki, who are known as the two great radical leaders of Japan. They are here to study political conditions and will then proceed to Paris in an unofficial capacity.

PUPILS UNDER QUARANTINE

Orders of Health Commissioner Are
Misunderstood at Seattle.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 2.—(Special).—School children, who have refused vaccination in the last few days at Ballard, Broadway and Queen Anne high schools and Alki, Lafayette and Lowell grade schools, are now under quarantine for two weeks.

Through a misunderstanding of the orders of the health commissioner, some of the children were told that the quarantine would date from the time the last case of smallpox was reported in the school at which they attend, but Dr. Reed said today that it was necessary to fix a definite date, and announced that the period of quarantine dates from the time of the refusal of vaccination.

Philomath Has "Flu" Again.

PHILOMATH, Or., April 2.—(Special).—"Flu" is again in the neighborhood of Belfontaine and Monroe and considerable sickness has ensued, interfering somewhat with the school work. The cases seem to be rather light but have been increasing rapidly in number.

DOCTORS HELD IN SERVICE

RELEASE OF FRED ZIEGLER
REFUSED BY OFFICIALS.

Letter From Surgeon-General Indi-
cates Physicians Will Be Re-
tained Several Months.

Although the city health bureau is
in need of the services of Dr. Fred J.
Ziegler, city physician, all efforts to
secure his discharge from the medical
corps of the United States army have
proved futile. Dr. Ziegler is a captain
in the United States army stationed at
Camp Lewis.

In a letter sent from the surgeon-
general's office in response to a tele-
gram dispatched by City Health Officer
Parrish urging that a release be granted
to Dr. Ziegler, it is said that the sur-
geon-general's office deems it imprac-
ticable to dispense with the services of
any member of the medical corps at
this time.

The city is invited, to make another
application for Captain Ziegler's release
in three months, when it is believed
that the need of the services of physi-
cians and surgeons in the army will not
be so imperative.

Dr. Parrish said yesterday that with
the hostilities at an end and the city
in dire need of Dr. Ziegler's services
he was of the opinion that the surgeon-
general's office should stretch a point
and give the captain his discharge.

"We are not complaining at our in-
ability to secure Captain Ziegler's ser-
vices," said Dr. Parrish, "but we can-
not help but consider it strange that
other members of the medical corps are
constantly being granted discharges
from the army and all efforts to secure
the return of Portland's city physician
have failed."

LAUNDRY CASH AUTHORIZED

City Officials Predict Better Service
at Financial Saving.

The park bureau is now ready to
enter into the laundry business on its
own account for the washing of towels
and bathing suits used in the free
swimming tanks in various of the mu-
nicipal parks.

The city council yesterday passed
an ordinance authorizing the expendi-
ture of \$750 for the purchase of elec-
tric washing and ironing machines.
Park Superintendent Keyser proposed
that the city do its own washing, al-
though that private laundries were charged
the city excessive prices for service.
Satisfactory adjustment could not
be made, according to Superintendent
Keyser, with the result that the city
now expects to secure better service at
a lesser cost to the city through a city-
owned and operated laundry.
