

ALL ARMY POWERS STORED BY ANSELL

Court-Martial for Lieutenant-Colonel Now Is Talk.

PROBE FOR BAKER STARTS

Inspector-General Chamberlain Is Conducting Investigation to See if Court-Martial Move Will Hold.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, April 4.—That Lieutenant Colonel Samuel T. Ansell, former acting judge advocate general of the army, may be ordered tried for alleged insubordinate conduct by the very court-martial system he has condemned as an institution of injustice is clearly indicated by developments here today.

From Secretary Baker down the powers that control the army have been alerted to a high degree of displeasure by the frank criticism that has been made on their administration of military justice and particularly by his statements regarding the veracity and good faith of his superior officers. In his letter to Secretary Baker, which had been suppressed and which was published yesterday, Lieutenant Colonel Ansell attacked the attitude of the secretary of war, the inspector-general of the army and Major-General Crowder.

His statements regarding the veracity and good faith of his superior officers, which he regarded as an unjustified attack on his own personal and official conduct in the Crowder letter which the secretary of war several weeks ago ordered spread broadcast through the press.

Major-General's Probe Defined.

It was developed today that the investigation now being conducted by the inspector-general of the army, is confined to the charges impugning each other's conduct and integrity which have been exchanged by Judge Advocate General Crowder and Colonel Ansell, who formerly was the acting judge advocate general and as such was decorated for distinguished war service.

An investigation of a high officer's conduct by the inspector-general is the usual course taken by the secretary of war to determine whether court-martial proceedings should be instituted.

It is too early to forecast the outcome of the inspector-general's investigation, but there is every reason to believe that Colonel Ansell will not be upheld by General Chamberlain's report.

Secretary Baker, when asked if the inspector-general's investigation is likely to be followed by a court martial, said:

Baker Says Nothing.

"I cannot say anything about that," Senator Chamberlain of Oregon, who scored Mr. Baker in a speech at Natchez, Miss., in connection with the court-martial question, came in for a display of the secretary's ire. In his speech at Natchez Senator Chamberlain spoke of Secretary Baker, General March and General Crowder as constituting a "Prussian military system." He said:

"My quarrel is not with the president; it is with Secretary Baker, and I am going to keep on quarreling so long as there is inefficiency in the war department."

Referring to Secretary Baker's recent assurance that steps were being taken to reform the court-martial system, Senator Chamberlain said: "You have to kick some people into doing their duty." It was these remarks which Secretary Baker characterized as "intemperate."

OREGON SURGEON RETURNS

CAPTAIN RALPH M. DODSON HOME FROM THE WAR.

Many New Things in Surgery Seen and Done While With British Army Medical Corps.

During sixteen months of service in the theater of operations on the western front, Captain Ralph M. Dodson, Oregon man, saw and did many new things in surgery. He has just returned to Portland, Ore., after visiting his father, Dr. O. M. Dodson, of Baker, Or. Once he was in charge of a train carrying 400 wounded British soldiers 70 miles to the rear. He was called to another station upon their arrival at their destination and later heard that only 15 per cent had lived.

AMERICA WORKERS' GOAL

HUNDREDS OF BRITISH APPLY FOR PASSAGE TO U. S.

Insufficient Space for Trans-Atlantic Traffic Has Effect of Exclusion of Immigrants.

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LONDON, April 4.—(Special cable.)—The American consulates throughout the United Kingdom, particularly the consulate-general here, are being besieged by hundreds of British workers anxious to go to America. The wholly insufficient space even for the most urgent transatlantic traffic is having the effect of a total exclusion act upon immigration.

As the American consuls, under the present circumstances, cannot also issue passports for the workers, at least 317 were turned down at the London consulate within the last few days. American agents who are now here to prepare plans for a great peace-time invasion by American tourists, found that a large army of Europeans intend to visit America as soon as possible to forget old world war memories. It is asserted that hatreds kindled by the war will induce Europeans to visit America during several years to come.

SHERIFF HEEDS CRITICISM

Officer at Seattle Jails Man, Then Issues Statement.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 4.—(Special.)—Following the open criticism by Superior Judge J. T. Ronald, when he learned from Deputy Prosecuting Attorney T. H. Patterson that J. Elmer Strom, wanted in Wyoming on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, was being permitted to go about his ordinary business and home life under a special guard, Sheriff John Stringer yesterday summoned Rheinstrom to the county-city building and issued him a warrant for his arrest.

Regarding Judge Ronald's criticism and his own action, Sheriff Stringer gave out the following typewritten statement:

"The kind old judge has apparently spoken without thinking. If he said what he is quoted in the newspapers as having said, as his order is to the effect that I am to have custody of this man until his further order, or that of the supreme court. The special guard is not on the payroll and is paid by Rheinstrom as custodian for me while Rheinstrom is settling up his business before being taken back to Wyoming. However, I have had Rheinstrom taken back to the jail."

University Professor Arrives.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, April 4.—(Special.)—Thomas A. Larremore, newly-appointed professor in the University of Oregon school of law, has taken up his work here, having arrived from Washington, D. C., where he was a member of the legal staff of the bureau of war risk insurance. Before going into that work he was for a year and a half a lieutenant in the sanitary corps. He is a graduate of Yale and of the Columbia law school and before entering the army was for one year an instructor in law at Stanford. His classes here are in conflict of laws, domestic relations, and business law.

Pioneer Winlock Man Drops Dead.

CHEHALIS, Wash., April 4.—(Special.) P. R. Arci, a pioneer Winlock resident, dropped dead while splitting wood. He was 70 years of age. A widow, three sons and one daughter survive the deceased. Mr. Arci was an early settler in Portland, Or., prior to moving to Winlock.
