GENERAL MAY GETS BUSY

ORGANIZATION OF NEW THIRD OREGON WELL UNDER WAY.

Valley Companies Announced; Trip Through Southern Oregon to Be Made This Week.

Brigadier-General May returned to Portland Saturday night after making a tour of the Willamette valley in arranging details for the placing of companies of the new Oregon regiment. He leaves today for southern Oregon, where he will confer with the people regarding the establishing of units of the new regiment.

Already seven companies are listed for Portland while Dallas and Independence have combined in company L. McMinnville has company A and Silverton and Woodburn will join in company I. The companies listed for Portland are B, C, D, K, headquarters, machine gun and supply. Salem will have company M, while Ashland, Medford and Marshfield are each to have a company.

With the redesignation of the 18th national guard division, the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming and South Dakota will be called on to complete the mobile Sun-set division, including nine regiments of infantry, one regiment of cavalry, one regiment of engineers, one brigade of field artillery and one sanitary train with the necessary field hospitals and ambulance companies. Portland has two engineer companies listed and will be known as the 1st Oregon engineers, says General May.

Plans at present are to have one of the battalion headquarters to be at Salem and another will be named as soon as the adjutant-general completes his tour this week. His journey to southern Oregon at this time is one of the prime reasons for selection of the 2d battalion headquarters.

Plans at present are to have the new 3d Oregon ready for inspection and official recognition by May 1. Later the coast defense companies will be organized, but nothing will be done until the new regiment is complete. In all probability there will be 10 or 12 companies of coast artillery organized in Oregon as soon as appropriations have been made.

In the new 16th (Sunset) national guard division, Oregon will be called on to furnish an infantry regiment, a squadron of cavalry, three batteries of field artillery, a battalion of engineers and a field hospital unit.

In his talk to the Biology club he explained the processes and compositions by which the gases were made and also told how gas masks protected the lives of front-line soldiers.

WOMAN POISONED IN CRITICAL CONDITION—Reports from the Good Samaritan hospital yesterday indicated that a woman, who the police found suffering from the effects of poison she had swallowed and from exposure to the elements, was in a critical condition yesterday. Physicians have determined that the poison she used was potassium cyanide, and they believe she attempted suicide, but have been unable to learn the motive for her act.

SOCIALIST IS CANDIDATE—Socialists Refuse to Indorse E. E. Welland, Who Opposes Republican for Councilman.

ABERDEEN, Wash., April 6.—(Special.)—There will be but one contest to lend interest to the city election here next Tuesday. This is in the Second ward, where William Irvine, republican, is running against E. E. Welland, socialist.

The socialists have formally refused to indorse Mr. Welland, who formerly was a socialist councilman.

The contest between Charles Craig and V. G. Skinner for the nomination in the First ward has been definitely decided in favor of Mr. Skinner. Mr. Craig and Mr. Skinner each had 31 votes, according to the primary count at the polls. TEACHERS NOT SATISFIED

Bonus Not Regarded as Adequate to Meet High Cost of Living.

Portland pedagogues, while rejoicing in the bonus granted them by the school board at its meeting Thursday afternoon, are inclined to believe more than the \$200,000 voted by the city to increase their salaries in proportion with the high cost of living and raised wages given other workers.

Next Monday the teachers will receive approximately \$84 additional during the remaining seven months of the school year, or about \$12 more monthly as a result of the bonus. Requests for back pay approximating \$200 in addition to a rise of \$20 monthly had been asked by them. With their discontent it is stated they seem to realize that it is not within the legal power of the school board to give them a larger increase. The bonus voted will be effective only until January 1, 1920.

Service Clubs Organizing.
YAKIMA, Wash., April 5.—Following the organization of several successful service clubs in different parts of the Yakima valley, a meeting is to be held on the evening of April 12 in this city to form a county organization. All the service clubs in the valley will be represented, it is expected. Besides Yakima, Macon, Grandview and Zillah have service clubs organized and clubs are being formed in Toppenish and Wapato.

Statistics made public Saturday by the district forest service show that during the last five years in Oregon and Washington there has been a loss of \$2,022,117.74 from 1,340,910 acres of state and national forests burned.

Eighty per cent of this loss was caused by man-made fires resulting from carelessness, malice or ignorance, it is estimated.

The number of thousands of board feet of timber lost through fire during this period is estimated at 1,706,034. Causes of the fires and the number of fires resulting from those causes are given as follows: lightning, 262; incendiary, 274; brush, 940; campers and stockmen, 1917; lumbering, 314; unknown, 256; miscellaneous, 255; total, 10,979 fires.
