

WHITE ELK TO AID IN LOAN CAMPAIGN

Cherokee Chief and Princess Arrive in Portland.

ADDRESSES TO BE GIVEN

Carlisle Graduate, Injured by Torpedo Explosion While in Navy, Volunteers Services.

Emery Olmstead had a visitor yesterday. Musing at home upon the manifold problems of the victory loan drive, he was startled, not to say staggered, at the wild splendor of his visitor. The great war-bonneted, eagle-plumed, the bearded buckskin, wampum, corrie and bone adornments, flabbergasted him for an instant.

"I have come," said the visitor, "to help you with the fifth liberty loan." Not exactly that abrupt but with a smiling proffer amounting to the same.

Whereupon Chairman Olmstead and Chief White Elk sat them generally down together as blood brothers and smoked a cigarette or so in token of peace and amity. Meantime they talked of the victory loan. The more they talked the better friends they became, as it was in the old days of the council, and as it should always be. They were agreed that Portland ought of right to "go over" with the rest of a Cherokee warrior out for his first scalp.

Chief White Elk, son of the Cherokee nation, and lineal descendant of its ancient tribal chieftains, arrived yesterday with his wife, the Princess Ah-tra-ah-sau, who is a daughter of the Klamath tribe, and considerable of an Oregonian for a long, long time of ancestral residence. In the splendor of old days, all the royal regalia of resplendent savagery, they entered the lobby and inquired for a suite. The clerk "got them" the first time, for their accents were those of the culture. To say that they created an eddy of interest thereabouts is putting it mildly.

Services Are Volunteered.
Both White Elk and his princess have volunteered their services to the Oregon campaign for the victory loan, and will be given speaking dates in Portland and elsewhere. They are, as original citizens of the country that they represent, and as the princess is a graduate of the University of Oregon, they are in the opinion of victory loan leaders.

For the matter of that, their patriotism has long since undergone the acid test. White Elk, who enlisted in the outbreak of the war, was in the crew of the battleship when a torpedo found its mark and sent the big transport reeling down to the bottom. As for the chief, up aloft in sailor's togs, the impact of the shot sent him tumbling down to the deck. He paid three ribs for his service in the navy and wears a steel plate in their stead.

About the princess, whose four-eyebled name translates most musically to "Valley of the Mountains," she would not rest at home. She was work overseas. So she joined the Red Cross and served in France, as deft and charming a nurse as any of the pale-face sisterhood. That was some time, however, before White Elk and Ah-tra-ah-sau were married.

White Elk is a graduate of Carlisle and of Rush Medical Institute. Football devotees will remember the days when he played on the team of the famous Indian college—a warrior whose native talents in football were bucking the line on the gridiron. Nor did White Elk give up football until 1916, when he reluctantly decided that others must uphold the honor of his alma mater.

All Drives Are Aided.
Eloquent speaker and fiery patriot, White Elk turned to other service when the torpedo mangled him out of the line. In New York, when the first Red Cross drive was on, he is credited with having raised an even \$1,000,000 for the cause. Since the winter of 1917 he has been enlisted in every war work drive, principally in his home state of California.

White Elk and Valley of the Mountains, both engaged in war work found time to be married when duty called them to Salt Lake City, in March, 1918. The ceremony was a public one, under the auspices of Elks lodge No. 88, and was accorded military honors by Colonel Ashbrook, commandant at Fort Douglas. The Federal, state and county officials were numbered among the guests.

During the third liberty loan drive White Elk was one of the principal speakers of the Oakland campaign, selling \$500,000 in bonds at a single luncheon. Called to San Francisco, he was detailed in charge of the army dugout truck, and with the princess as aide placed \$1,500,000 of liberty bonds in one week. Drive after drive followed, war work of all kinds, many raffles, and White Elk and his bride proved indispensable. At one San Francisco rally the princess laid aside her regalia and sought the highest bidder. It brought \$5000 to the victory loan quota. In the several war work campaigns, including victory loans, the two are credited with having raised \$3,864,000.

"From the experience we've had with our own people," said White Elk last night, "from the faithful service they've given, both in lives and money, we have come to feel that all are equal in this America of ours, and that all should be sharing in the victory that our nation strove for here and overseas. It is our hope that some day our people may raise their heads and feel that they have a full share in that liberty."

Indians Are Patriots.
"We are patriots, we Indians. If you question that, look at the records of our race in the war. Turn to the contributions toward the financial needs of the war. There are Indian names in every casualty list. It is our America."

"The newspapers of Oregon have been an inspiration to the Indians of this state and Washington in the liberty loan and other war work campaigns. I know of articles that have inspired our people to give, and give freely. One small Indian community in this district gave 20 times its quota to a liberty loan. We think that compares well with the records of those who came here and took possession of our land."

But the chief said this smilingly, without a trace of criticism or bitterness. His eagle plumes nodded as he talked, and the bone and shell ornaments on his broad chest jangled pleasantly. He waved a cigarette with the blandness of long custom. It is to be presumed, however, that he was not altogether unconscious of the curiously admiring glances that beat upon him from every direction.

Chief White Elk and his princess are accompanied by C. H. Addison of Chicago, recently a lieutenant in the national service.

LOAN TERMS ANNOUNCED

NEW ISSUE TO BE FOR FOUR AND A HALF BILLIONS.

This Will Be Last of Liberty Loans, Says Secretary Glass in Statement Giving Details.

covered by the maturity dates of treasury certificates of indebtedness now outstanding, will fully provide for the retirement of such securities. The issue will be limited to \$4,500,000,000, except as it may be necessary to increase or decrease the amount to facilitate allotments. Oversubscriptions will be rejected and allotments made on a graduated scale similar in its general plan to that adopted in connection with the first liberty loan. Allotment will be made in full on subscriptions up to and including \$10,000.

Interest Rate Highest Yet.
The interest rate of 4 1/2 per cent is the highest borne by any of the war issues. Financial interests have urged a 5 per cent rate, but Secretary Glass indicated recently that he regarded such a rate as excessive and speculation to the rate recently has revolved about 4 1/2 per cent. The 3 1/2 per cent rate of the tax exempt notes, into which the 4 1/2 is convertible, is the lowest rate of any of the war issues.

The coming loan is the only loan since the first which oversubscriptions have not been accepted in whole or in part. Compared with the \$6,925,000,000 subscriptions of the fourth loan, the aggregate of the victory issue will be nearly \$2,500,000,000 less.

Already \$5,155,000,000 certificates of indebtedness have been issued, including the current issue, in connection with the victory liberty loan, but \$600,000,000 of these have been called in for immediate redemption. There remain outstanding \$200,000,000 more certificates than proceeds of the victory loan, to be met from tax receipts or from proceeds from future issues of certificates.

Other Issues Not Considered.
For some time the treasury had contemplated terms for the victory loan which would have a direct influence in keeping up the market price of past issues, but apparently these plans were abandoned.

The terms of the victory issue may be compared with the following terms of past issues:
First loan, \$2,000,000,000 three and one-half per cent tax exempt, maturity 20 years.
Second loan, \$3,000,000,000 offered, \$6,170,000,000 subscribed, \$3,300,000,000 accepted, four per cent, partially tax exempt, maturity 25 years.
Third loan, \$3,000,000,000 offered, \$4,170,000,000 subscribed and accepted, 4 1/2 per cent, partially tax exempt, maturity ten years.
Fourth loan, \$5,000,000,000 offered, \$6,925,000,000 subscribed and accepted, 4 1/2 per cent partially tax exempt, with special conditional exemptions for past issues, maturity 20 years.

War savings stamps bear the equivalent of 4 per cent interest and mature in five years.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 13.—The 12th Federal reserve bank district's quota in the fourth victory liberty loan issue of \$4,500,000,000 will be \$301,500,000, according to a statement issued here tonight by James K. Lynch, governor of the Federal reserve bank, based on advice received by him from Secretary of the Treasury Carter Glass.

San Francisco's quota, it was announced, will be \$301,500,000. Quotas of other cities and states of the 12th district will be approximately 75 per cent of the quotas of the fourth liberty loan, Mr. Lynch announced.

OREGON LOAN HEADS REJOICE
Reduction in Sum to Be Raised Is Taken as Assurance of Victory.

Reduction of the victory loan 25 per cent under the total of the fourth liberty loan was acclaimed with jubilation when Oregon's loan drive directors learned of it yesterday. So great a reduction had not been expected. That it makes triumph for this state certain and a decidedly lighter task than anticipated was the consensus of opinion.

share of this, again using the old basis of calculation, will be \$13,541,000 and that of the state outside of Portland around \$11,640,000. There may be slight deviation in these figures in the event that up-state bank deposits have made more rapid increase than those of Portland's banks. The advance quota announced for Portland had been given as \$19,181,500.

"This is a pleasing announcement," said Edward Cookingham, chairman of the victory loan in Oregon. "We had not thought that the loan total would be so small. There ought not to be the slightest question now about raising the quotas that will fall to state and city."

"I have not received official notification of Mr. Glass' decision, but will no doubt receive it tomorrow. Our state quota, on the new basis, will be between \$25,000,000 and \$26,000,000."

District Quota \$10,325,000.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—Allotments of the \$200,000,000 bond issue of the war finance corporation are announced by federal reserve districts. The quota of the San Francisco, twelfth federal reserve district, is \$10,325,000.

tion of the communists in depositing the revolutionary council republic. Three would-be governments are now in existence in Bavaria.

Russian Aids Communists.
The first act of the communists was the creation of a council of ten, which was proclaimed in power. Armed bands then stormed the police stations, disarming the police and arresting several officials as hostages. The communists were aided by the Russian Bolshevik leader Dr. Levien, who recently returned from Russia.

The peasants' ban on the shipment of food to Munich, which has been in effect since last Tuesday, is operating with disastrous effects. Augsburg likewise is cut off from food shipments.

Hostility Shown to Jews.
Pamphlets are being distributed calling the populace to rise against the Jews.

COPENHAGEN, April 12.—A wireless message from Munich by way of Berlin, says heavy fighting occurred at the railway station in Munich last evening, and a decisive struggle was expected hourly.

BERNE, April 12.—(By the Associated Press.)—The anti-Bolshevik movement among the peasants and middle classes in Bavaria is spreading, according to advice received today. Several of the garrisons have declared for the government of Premier Hoffmann, among those at Ingolstadt, Dillingen and Neuburg.

BERNE, April 13.—(By the Associated Press.)—The strike in the Ruhr district is abating, dispatches from German sources report. At the Krupp works in Essen two-thirds of the men are again at work.

BERLIN, April 14.—(By the Associated Press.)—The Berlin police force has become so ineffective and so powerless to check street gambling, plundering and daylight robberies aggregating millions of marks, that the municipal assembly has unanimously adopted a resolution to turn over the police department to Prussia, provided the state is willing to assume charge.

LONDON, April 13.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph from Budapest, dated Saturday, says an unconfirmed report has been received there that a revolution has broken out in Serbia and that the troops are fraternizing with the Hungarian Red Guards.

SOVIETS TIRE OUT BAVARIANS
Sentiment Against New Regime Is Steadily Growing.

BERLIN, April 12.—Sentiment among a large proportion of the people of Munich against the new regime of Bavaria, is steadily growing. The people are weary of the alleged ruthlessness, incompetence and strange methods and decrees of the new Soviet regime. Ratisbon, Schweinfurt, Furth and Augsburg have gone back to the old regime.

Other towns are expected to return to the old alliance soon, leaving the communists to face the opposition of the bourgeoisie in Munich on the one hand and of the peasants on the other.

M'ADOO MAKES LOAN SPEECH AT MEDFORD

Subscriptions Held Debt of Honor to Soldiers.

BOYS' HEROISM IS LAUDED

Former Secretary of Treasury Expresses Confidence That People Will Respond Eagerly.

MEDFORD, Or., April 13.—(Special.)—From the platform of his private car on the regular Portland train, ex-Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo delivered a 15-minute address to the people of Medford tonight on the victory loan and the league of nations.

The address was entirely impromptu and only arranged Sunday morning by a group of local democrats headed by Postmaster Mims, who met Secretary McAdoo's train across the California line and rode with him to Medford. Word was sent forward that Mr. McAdoo had consented to make a short talk and word was sent over the city by telephone.

Several hundred persons gathered at the station and welcomed the former secretary and democratic leader. "In subscribing all we can to the victory loan," said Mr. McAdoo, "we are merely discharging a debt of honor to our boys and your boys who saved our country and saved us thousands of lives and billions of treasure by winning the great struggle against evil and autocracy before we expected it was possible."

Soldiers' Feats Laundered.
"Sixty thousand of them gave their lives, many thousands more gave their health, their sight, their arms and legs for the cause of liberty, to the defense of which we sent them. They did the job well—gloriously well. They not only knocked the Kaiser out of the saddle, they knocked him clean into Holland, and he will get something more or I am very much mistaken. It took money to do that. That money has been spent. Now your country merely asks you to pay that bill."

"It isn't much of a sacrifice, in fact, it is no sacrifice at all. It is a privilege or should be considered as such. It is merely a chance for you who stayed at home to do your part and to show those gallant lads that you appreciate what they did, and don't intend to desert them now that the war is over. It is easy to be patriotic when patriotism means self-interest, safety from danger, security. The real test of patriotism comes now. And if I know my country and my countrymen, the total subscriptions here, there, everywhere, will show that the same spirit that won the victory over there, will oversubscribe the victory loan over here."

Meaning of Loan Told.
"This is not my responsibility now. I am merely a private citizen. But I feel I express your sentiment when I say that this victory loan is not only an expression of appreciation for what our boys have done, but an expression of faith in the organization of a better world, in which war will be impossible. Let us place this supreme question of a league of nations above prejudice, above party. The present moment is the most stupendous since the birth of Christ. Let us be worthy of it. We have no selfish aims. Let us realize that what we want as a nation, what our leaders are trying to secure, is no advantage for ourselves but a better era for humanity. There are 5,000,000 soldiers dead, probably 15,000,000 civilians dead before their time, because hatred of the world has been organized for war. Now let us organize the world for peace."

TRIAL FLIGHT SUCCESSFUL
Naval Seaplane Carries 28,500 Pounds Over Jamaica Bay.
NEW YORK, April 13.—The naval seaplane No. 25, one of the machines to be used by the navy department in its trans-Atlantic flight, made yesterday what navy officers described as a "successful trial flight" over Jamaica Bay from the naval air station at Rockaway Beach.

The giant plane rose from the surface with a load estimated at 28,500 pounds, said to be the heaviest burden ever carried in a machine of this type.

Salvador Minister Arrives.
SAN FRANCISCO, April 13.—Salvador Sol, minister to the United States from Salvador, arrived here today on the steamer Newport from San Salvador, en route to Washington.

Wealthy Shipbuilder Dies.
LOS ANGELES, April 12.—Captain

Samuel Crangle, wealthy shipbuilder and master of Toronto, Canada, died at his winter home here today following a brief illness. He was 80 years old. He is survived by a widow, who was with him here. The body will be sent to Toronto for interment.

Tuberculin Tests Arranged.
SOUTH BEND, Wash., April 13.—(Special.)—County Agriculturalist George A. Nelson of Pacific county has made arrangements with the state veterinarian's office in Olympia to have a state examiner come to Pacific county May 1 to conduct tuberculin tests among the dairy cattle of this county. So far applications for the testing of about 300 cows have been filed with the county agent's office, and farmers desiring to have their cattle tested at this time must make application prior to May 1. All tuberculin tests are to be made free of any cost to the dairymen.
